Rabbinic Reflections

A Chanukah of Light and Joy



Chanukah in Israel is: street fairs, parties, tzedakah, joyful prayer, jelly donuts, menorahs outside in front of every home, and more jelly donuts.

I am filled with wonder whenever I am in Israel for Chanukah. The entire country brings the holiday to life. It is the modern celebration of the life and miracle of our people's existence for the last 2,000 years.

When I lived in Israel, the Jerusalem street fair in my neighborhood captured the spirit of celebration. The preparation began at 3:00 in the afternoon as the street was closed and the sound system was checked (I lived a half block from the main street and vividly heard the test). By 5:00 pm, the street came to life with, musicians throughout the street, outdoor stands from every restaurant, and jelly donuts. In Israel jelly donuts are the staple, instead of latkes, and they were everywhere. It was a delight to watch as parents walked holding the hands of their children and to see everyone come together for the lighting of the giant menorah and singing of Ma-oz Tzur, Rock of Ages.

Chanukah is also about caring for others. At Pardes, the Institute where I studied, we sponsored a party for new immigrants from Ethiopia. A group of students from Pardes worked with children of the immigrants once a week to help them learn Hebrew and adapt to Israeli life. This was their first Chanukah. It was amazing to experience the love in the room. There was a play to tell the story of Chanukah, art projects, and games. Everyone was uplifted to share as we literally celebrated the miracle of these Jews who found refuge in the Promised Land.

Three years ago when I was in Israel for Chanukah, one of the most powerful experiences for me was praying on the Friday night of Chanukah at the Western Wall to welcome Shabbat. There were throngs of people and a giant menorah mounted near the wall. The singing and dancing was ecstatic and profound as we stood in the place which was once destroyed by Rome and now symbolizes the blessing of Jewish life. The service for Chanukah contained a special insert for the holiday. My heart overflowed as I said the words:

"And for the miracles and for the salvation and for the mighty deeds, and for the victories, and for the battles which You performed for our ancestors in those days, at this time. In the days of Mattitiyahu, the son of Yochanan, the Hasmomean, and his sons – when the wicked Greek kingdom rose up against Your people Israel to make them forget your Torah and compel them to stray from the statutes of Your will – You in Your great mercy stood up for them in their time of distress."

My experience at the Wall concluded as I walked home through the Old City. The Mitzvah of Chanukah is to "Proclaim the miracle." In Israel, people buy special glass boxes so they can put their menorahs outside for everyone to share in the affirmation of faith. It was a magical moment as I walked with hundreds of people, saw the beautiful menorahs and was warmed by the glow of their light as a beacon of faith to guide me home.

Chanukah for all of us is a time to celebrate with family and friends and to affirm the joys of life. On this holiday, we are linked to the Jewish community around the world and throughout history. May your Chanukah be a holiday of "Light and Joy."

The darkest time of the year, Kislev is also known as the 'month of dreams' because of the Torah portions that fall within this month – Jacob's ladder that ascends to the heavens, and Joseph's dreams that he shares with his brothers as well as his later interpretations of Pharoah's dreams. Dreams have the power of shedding light on thoughts, worries and fears that we carry deep in our subconscious minds. May this month of Kislev help bring light, clarity and healing to your waking moments, and may the Lights of Hanukkah illuminate your days with warmth and joy.

Dear Fellow Congregants,

I hope you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving Day, hopefully with all your family in attendance. I for one know that when you have parents, children or other loved ones living far away, this is not always

possible.

Without commenting on our political situation, I wanted to share with you some possible issues that would be relative to many of our congregants should the proposed new tax laws come to pass.

The addition of an increase in the Standard deduction could adversely affect certain taxpayers in that it is intended to eliminate the benefit of charitable contributions in the future. A hedge against this change would be achieved by accelerating your contributions in 2017.

This could also create a lack of benefit to have IRA and other qualified plans disburse directly to a charity of either unneeded Required Minimum Distributions.

Another benefit before the end of the year would be purchase space on our new Memorial Wall before the need occurs. Also, think about reserving two places, if you can, so spouses can be next to each other. These costs can also be deductible in most instances.

It is essential that you discuss these things with your Tax advisor or preparer to assure these suggestions would benefit you.

My family and I wish you and your loved ones a Happy Chanukah and hope that 2018 brings you joy and a healthy year.

Last month US government scientists produced the most comprehensive report on climate change ever, showing this last century was the warmest since human have been on the planet. And in Bonn, Germany, scientists, administrators, and statesmen met to further the work of the 2015 UN Paris Climate Agreement.

Wait a minute here - isn't this supposed to be a column on mental health?

Have you ever struggled through a heat wave? Can you remember how irritable you got? How stressed? Everything in life was harder until cooler weather came. And most of us who've lived in hot city islands know there's bound to be more trouble on the streets in the hottest nights of summer. What happens when heat waves are spread wider around the world, last longer, and are just plain hotter?

And what about this? – Imagine losing your entire country with its particular culture to rising seas. It's happening right now in the South Pacific. People are looking for other countries to take them in. And as they move, their close-knit communities are breaking up. Think how that feels.





THE JEWISH COMMUNITIES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE PARTNERING TO DO TZEDAKAH

The **United Jewish Fund of the Inland Empire** (UJFIE) provides the Jewish communities of the Inland Empire a meaningful way to practice Tzedakah, Charity. **UJFIE** was established during 2016-2017 by leaders of the Inland Empire Jewish communities.

For more than 70 years Jews of the greater San Bernardino area have supported Jewish causes world-wide, especially in Israel, and locally through the **San Bernardino United Jewish Welfare Fund.** And likewise, for more than 70 years Jews of the greater Riverside area have supported Jewish causes world-wide, especially in Israel, and locally through the **Riverside Jewish Community Fund.** For a number of years a local campaign to meet Jewish needs was conducted as the Victorville United Jewish Appeal. These organizations raised hundreds of thousands of dollars and enabled Jews to practice the supreme value of *TZEDAKAH*.

The Inland Empire has expanded. Today it includes Banning-Beaumont, Corona, High-land, Redlands, Victorville-Apple Valley, San Bernardino, Riverside and the mountain communities. The time has come for Jews of this growing Inland Empire to join together to do the sacred work of *Tzedakah*.

WHAT DO OUR DONATIONS TO THE UNITED JEWISH FUND OF THE INLAND EMPIRE SUPPORT?

LOCALLY - Our Tzedakah is already supporting important needs **locally**. Assistance with purchasing Passover foods has been given to indigent individuals and families in our communities. Transportation to synagogue services is being provided to seniors. Jewish youths are being enabled to attend enriching Jewish camps. Students at the colleges in the Inland Empire (University of California at Riverside, University of Redlands, California State University San Bernardino, Riverside City College, College of the Desert) are being supported in creating meaningful Jewish activities on their campuses through the Inland and Desert Hillel Council. Funds are set aside to respond to emergency needs of Jews in the Inland Empire who are victims of natural disasters or facing medical or economic challenges....

ISRAEL - There are numerous pockets of poverty, orphanages, hospitals, schools, senior citizen centers that need more support than the citizens of Israel can provide through their taxes. Support is being given through the UJFIE to those engaged in struggles for religious equality in Israel. Innovative programs bringing together young people of diverse backgrounds will be receiving support.

WORLDWIDE - There are humanitarian emergencies all over the world affecting Jews and non-Jews alike. Through the UJFIE we can express our ethical responsibility to ensure the welfare of all. There are emerging Jewish communities throughout much of Eastern Europe that need our help.

NATIONALLY - The UJFIE is supporting a variety of organizations that explore and expand dimensions of Jewish identity - religiously, culturally, educationally, and socially as well as those that effectively combat anti-Semitism.
