Purim Memories



What are your Purim memories? For me Purim is an adventure and a time of joy ...

<u>Be</u> <u>Who</u> <u>You Always</u> <u>Want to Be?</u> In my synagogue in New York, beyond costumes of Mordecai and Esther we dressed in a myriad of guises. I got to be the Tin Man from Wizard of Oz, Barney, Obi Wan Kenobi from Star Wars, and a Teenage Ninja Mutant

Turtle. In addition to the fun, in each character I brought to life a different aspect of my personality that it was fun to amplify and explore.

<u>Hamantaschen</u>. Everyone has their favorite Hamantaschen story. I think of my friend Marc, who is a vegetarian chef, and how he made designer flavors including chocolate and peanut butter, the fun of working with children and watching them roll the dough and make their personal hamantaschen, and trips to Israel near Purim when I would bring back Israeli Hamantachen for friends.

<u>Your Favorite Shpiel.</u> As I travel around the country many congregations have wonderful traditions for their Shpiel. In, Connecticut it was an annual event where every child in the religious school of 78 participated. Children choose to act, sing, or work on the sets. There was anticipation each year because the starring roles were reserved for the seventh grade who were the oldest in the school.

In Cherry Hill, New Jersey there was a full Purim Shpiel production with the teenagers of the congregation. The year I served the congregation the theme was the Beatles. Over 30 teens retold the story via classical Beatles songs. It was an annual event that was cherished by everyone.

KAM Isaiah Israel, in Chicago, did an original shpiel written by a member of the congregation, there were auditions, roles for members of every age group, and Chicago political humor ...

<u>*Carnivals.*</u> One of my favorite memories growing-up was the Purim carnival. I remember great prizes: goldfish, paddle ball, yoyos, and click n' catch (*if you don't know what it is please ask*). Through the years I enjoyed temple carnivals that were run by and for children ... with the help of teenagers for others. It always warms my heart to see a fifth grader help out a three-year-old so he or she can be a winner!

This year we have planned a wonderful celebration for Sunday, February 25th: The School of Jewish Learning will begin at 9:30 AM and the program will start with the Purim Shpiel at 10:00 AM. Cantor Bern-Vogel is planning the Purim Schpiel entitled: *The Little Mermaideleh Purim Schpiel*. It will involve all ages from young children to teens to adults. The parents and students of the School for Jewish Learning will run the carnival (it will begin immediately after the Schpiel). Please look at the bulletin and emails for details.

In the Jewish calendar, Purim begins Wednesday, February 28. We've scheduled the Congregation Emanu-El celebration to Sunday. We made this change to include as many congregants as possible. An evening celebration is difficult for families with young children and for congregants who find it difficult to drive at night.

Purim is a time of celebration and memory. A time where share our joy as a congregation, recall special times from the past, and create new memories for our children. I hope you will join us for a wonderful Purim this year.

But the Jews that were in Shushan assembled together on the thirteenth day thereof, and on the fourteenth thereof; and on the fifteenth day of the same they rested, and made it a day of feasting and gladness. Therefore, do the Jews of the villages, that

dwell in the unwalled towns, make the fourteenth day of the month of Adar a day of gladness and feasting." Esther 9:18-19

February is the shortest month but we will celebrate to the fullest! Our Sisterhood Shabbat on February 9th will be a very special one this year, with many participants sharing personal stories of their memories and heartfelt connections with the liturgy and Jewish tradition.

The Hebrew month of Adar is the most joyous of all Hebrew months because of the Festival of Purim. There is nevertheless a hint of pathos because it could have ended up quite differently for the Jews in Persia who were in grave danger of total annihilation. Esther, one of our greatest heroines, had to summon enormous courage to aid her people in defeating the evil intentions of Haman. Haman was a descendant of the tribe of Amalek who also endeavored to wipe out the Jewish people. The Shabbat preceding Purim is called Shabbat Zachor - or the Shabbat of Remembrance. In our Torah reading, which begins with the word Zachor, we are commanded to remember the misdeeds of Amalek. Therefore, we intend to celebrate Erev Purim with 'gladness and feasting' and... THE LITTLE MERMAIDELEH PURIMSPHIEL written by Cantor Marni Camhi, directed by yours truly, and performed by all of you so stay tuned!!

I hope you have marked your calendars, March 18, 2018, at 4pm for this year's Cantor's Concert celebrating the music of Leonard Bernstein, Irving Berlin and the Beatles! As in past years, I will be welcoming half a dozen cantorial colleagues from southern California, plus musicians including beloved cellist Michele Tacchia and percussionist, John Gann, who love coming out to Redlands to share their many talents. I hope all of you have started this new year with a bang! I know we have here as the stewards of Congregation Emanu El. The last week of December 2017, thanks to your generosity to the Mortgage Reduction Fund as well as a

major gift, we made a Principal reduction payment of **\$100,000.00** on our building mortgage. Our balance is now down to \$1,400,000.00. This payment will reduce our annual interest by over \$4,000.00. With your continued support, we hope to be able to continue to reduce the obligation. Thank you for your continuing support.

With your help we are constantly reducing our expenses and improving our cash flow. Thank you for enabling us to meet our financial needs as they mature by supporting our events both financially as well as participation. We welcome your thoughts as to fundraising events.

LANDSCAPING UPDATE

Abatement of our gopher population and restoration of our irrigation system is now completed. The next step in our grounds beautification project is to begin reliable and more ambitious weekly maintenance. The Board of Directors has approved the hiring of the W. Wood Company for this purpose. The W. Wood Company was selected from four bidding contractors. They have knowledge of our grounds, as they were the original landscapers of our campus; they were able to repair our complex irrigation system after several other suppliers could not; they have expertise in both landscaping and maintenance so that they assist in the design and installation of new hard- and soft-scapes as our beautification project evolves.

The grounds improvement project will be implemented one section at a time. We have congregants who have expressed interest in funding specific areas of our campus and they will be included in discussions with the W. Wood Company as to how to best landscape specific areas. Sisterhood Speaks



I joined Sisterhood originally to meet other women and to feel like a part of the Jewish community. I soon found I was part of a group of women of all ages who enjoyed being with others, and who had ideas about how to improve the synagogue. Sisterhood board meetings impressed me with just how many responsibilities we

undertook. One function was Bikkur Cholim, visiting the sick and shut in. Isabel Helfman came to meetings to report on her visits, as she originated the role. I remember Isabel as sweet and kind; she was serious about visiting shut-ins to continue their contact with Congregation Emanu El. She had not been well for several years, and she died in December. I wish there was someone who would continue her legacy for us.

Another community function was Condolence Meals. One or two Sisterhood members would bring a dairy meal to the home of the deceased, set up the meal for the mourners while they were at the funeral and cemetery, and then leave after the mourners returned. Of course, it was always a rush, last-minute arrangement. Before I was a working mother, I did several condolence meals, and I met congregants and enjoyed the feeling of service. In the past, several people have taken on this job for a long time: Kail Rosen and Heidi Nimmo each chaired this for years. Last month we were asked to set up a condolence in the synagogue, and Phyllis Sweet, Margaret Shattuck, Susan Damron, and Lea Shuster came in to help. Other members helped out by bringing baked goods for us to put out. The family of Dr. Gary Schwartz was quite appreciative. Right now, Condolence is ad hoc, but Sisterhood needs a long term chair for this role, too.

If you attended our Casino Night on January 20, you know we really do put on a great party. The committee, chaired by Jill Weissman and Karyn Lehmann did an incredible job. If you missed it this year, be sure to join us next year.

February will be busy for us. February 4 is Mitzvah Day. Sisterhood will facilitate projects developed by Women of Faith. For many years Congregation Emanu El has held a special day to emphasize mitzvot. Elsewhere in this bulletin and in our weekly Constant Contact are more details. Mental Health Awareness

Denial. A psychological reaction that sometimes helps and sometimes harms. Denial can protect us from a shock that might kill us. Denial can give us time to come to terms with a sudden unexpected loss. However, denial can also prevent us from effectively dealing with a threat.

With climate change, denial is a major problem. Uncertainty about global warming often creates fear and a feeling that the problem is too huge. That leads to denial and avoidance. Psychological distance helps us fool ourselves that climate change is happening at some distant future time, or in some distant place. On top of that, especially in this country, climate change has become a political issue in the past decade or so. It has gotten hitched to a fabric of political and social attitudes that many people are psychologically committed to.

We might think that as more extreme weather events occur around the world and at home, people will open their eyes to the reality of a radically changing climate. And for some this is just what happens. But not as much as we might think. George Marshall in his book, *Don't Even Think About It: Why Our Brains are Wired to Ignore Climate Change*, makes it clear that for some of us a major traumatic weather disaster results in a stronger denial. How's that? Well, if you believe that the disaster is part of a pattern sure to occur again, that's even more frightening than if it's a freak occurrence.

The changing climate is harming our physical and mental health, even our political discourse.

Parts of Louisiana are under continual threat of storm surges and rising sea levels. Many people have left certain low-lying towns that flood frequently. Others can't afford to get out. The state government wants to buy them out and get them to higher ground, but there's no money for it. Imagine the anxiety of living in that situation, little boats always at the ready. It's happening now all around the planet.

Weather extremes are today's reality. Good mental health requires us to end denial about climate change.

32nd Annual Rabbi Norman F. Feldheym Memorial Lecture



The Rabbi Norman F. Feldheym Memorial Lecture was established in 1985 at the time of his death by members of Congregation Emanu EI as well as many friends in the wider community. Rabbi Feldheym served as rabbi of Congregation Emanu EI in San Bernardino from 1937 to 1971 and as Rabbi Emeritus from 1971 until his death. He was called to serve as a chaplain in the United States Army twice - once in World War II (1942-46) where he served in the European Theatre and once in the Korean conflict (1950-52). He was awarded the Bronze Star and six battle medals. In recognition of his notable leadership San Bernardino's Central Library was named the "Norman F. Feldheym Central Library." Over the years the annual lecture has dealt with some of Rabb Feldheym's major interests including Art, Dreams, Interfaith activities and Social Justice.

Rabbi Denise Eger is the founding rabbi of Congregation Kol Ami, West Hollywood's Reform Synagogue. Rabbi Eger has served pulpits in Canada, New York and Los Angeles. Following ordination, she served Congregation Beth Chayim Chadashim for four years as its first full-time rabbi.

In 2015 Rabbi Eger became President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis which is the largest organization of Rabbis; More than 2000 Reform rabbis world-wide. She was the first openly gay or lesbian rabbi to that position. Rabbi Eger is a past President of the Southern California Board of Rabbis (the first woman and openly gay person to do so) and a past President of the Pacific Association of Reform Rabbis.

Rabbi Eger believes that activism is an important part of her rabbinate. She has worked extensively with people with AIDS. She served as co-chair of the Community Advisory Board of the Shanti Foundation and is a past Chair of the Spiritual Advisory Committee of AIDS Project Los Angeles.

She co-chaired the Gay and Lesbian Rabbinic Network for two years. She is a past Treasurer of the Women's Rabbinic Network. She was the founding President of the Lesbian, Gay, & Bisexual Interfaith Clergy Association. She is active on the steering committee of the California Faith for Equality and helped to organize Jews for Marriage Equality. She is a member of the Religion and Faith Council of the Human Rights Campaign.

Denise L. Eger was raised in Memphis, TN. She graduated with honors from the University of Southern California with a Bachelor's Degree in Religion in 1982. She received her Master's Degree from Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in 1985 and was ordained as Rabbi in 1988 at the New York campus of HUC.

Rabbi Eger is married to Rabbi Eleanor Steinman and has a son in college.

DR. GARY P. ZOLA WILL SPEAK ON "HE WAS ONE OF US: THE JUDAIZATION OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN"



Dr. Gary P. Zola is the Executive Director of The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives and Edward M. Ackerman Family Distinguished Professor of the American Jewish Experience at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati. Professor Zola edits The Marcus Center's award-winning biannual pulication, The American Jewish Archives Journal – one of only two academic periodicals focusing on the total historical experience of American Jewry.

In 2011 Dr. Zola was apppointed by President Obama to the Commission for the Preservation of American Heritage Abroad. In 2006 he became the first



American Jewish historian and the first American rabbi to receive appointment to the Academic Advisory Councl of the congressionally recognized Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission. Dr. Zola was ordained as a rabbi at HUC-JIR in 1982 and received his Ph.D in American Jewish history in 1991.

The Rabbi Hillel Cohn Endowed Lecture on the Contemporary Jewish Experience was established at California State University, San Bernardino in recognition of Rabbi Cohn's many achievements as a religious and community leader. This is the first time in the history of the entire California State University system that a rabbi has been so honored. Each year the Endowed Lecture brings scholars of note to the Inland Empire and the Coachella Valley. Rabbi Cohn served as rabbi of Congregation Emanu El in San Bernardino 1963-2001, 2014-2015 and is now rabbi emeritus of that historic congregation, now located in Redlands. In 2010 Rabbi Cohn chaired the City of San Bernardino Bicentennial Commission. In 2017 he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters by CSUSB.
