Rabbinic Reflection



As you peruse the articles and programming announcements in the January Bulletin, I am likely somewhere over the Atlantic Ocean on my way to Israel. Gathering with a group of rabbis and Jewish educators, we will study issue of modern Israel, and most importantly, we will discuss how to make

these issues relevant to American Jews who may sometimes feel disconnected from our spiritual homeland. As part of this learning process, we will visit a variety of communities and educational settings across the country. It is my hope that this will not only translate into a greater understanding of the diversity of Israel, but also open some discussion on how we can share this diversity in America. I believe we have much to learn from Israel in the area of diversity. While Israel is not a perfect nation, for there is no such thing, it has been a light unto the nations. Israel is among the first countries to announce a program to resettle Syrian refugees from Aleppo. At the same time. Israel struggles with the challenges of what to do with illegal immigrants who reside within its borders and who function as productive members of society.

I am particularly interested in hearing from Israelis about the recent abstention by the United States in the vote over UN Security Council Resolution 2334 regarding Israeli settlement policy and other issues. Along with the vast majority of Jewish leaders in America, I am deeply troubled by this latest foreign policy decision by the outgoing administration. It delegitimizes a Jewish presence in the Old City of Jerusalem, creates unrealistic expectations of borders in a final status agreement without proper negotiations, and worst of all, it provides cover for anti-Israel activists.

I am most excited about sharing some of the experience with all of you. On Sunday morning, January 8, I will speak live from the middle of the Negev desert, via Facetime, with the students in our School for Jewish Living, answering their questions about Israel. The next evening, Monday, January 9, I will have a session with our 11th & 12th grade students as I bring them with me, again live via Facetime, to sunrise at the Kotel in Jerusalem. For the rest of you, I will be sharing thoughts throughout the trip on my personal Facebook page and Twitter feed, as well as posting updates on the Congregation Emanu El Facebook page. Additionally, I will speak about the trip at Shabbat services in Friday, January 13, the day after I return stateside.

I wish all of you a happy and healthy 2017!

Cantorial Comments



'My Favorite Things' and more!!!

Happy 2017! There is so much going on, it's hard to know where to start... But, instead of 'at the very beginning' — it seems we should start with C!

Next month, our Cantor's

Concert theme will be: "My Favorite Things." With a few of my favorite colleagues, we will be presenting a potpourri of some of our favorite songs from various genres including liturgical, musical theater, opera, blues, Yiddish and Hebrew. We hope you will tell your friends to come and order your tickets today!

Since the end of October, I have been meeting twice a month with eight dedicated members of our new Cantillation class. It is always a privilege to be able to help people learn the skills of Torah Cantillation and encourage them to embrace their voice in chanting Torah – especially women who were not allowed to do it when they were growing up in more observant communities. Several more people have expressed interest in the next class which will start sometime in the latter half of 2017. Our current group is looking forward to participating in Shabbat morning services on May 20th which will also be partially led by our Religious School students. A multi-generational experience, to be sure!

As a recently Board Certified Chaplain, I have started working in hospice with the Jewish Healing Center of Los Angeles, an outgrowth of the Jewish Hospice Project of Los Angeles (JHPLA), founded in 2001 by Rabbi Carla Howard – the very first hospice agency in the L.A. Jewish community.

We must all be 'Chevre of Tikkun Olam' – friends of social action at this critical time in our country's history. We need to keep abreast of discriminatory policies that may arise and extend our hands and hearts to other minorities and groups that may be targeted with hate crimes as a result of these policies. At the recommendation of the Religious Action Center, [RAC] Reform California and the URJ, we are charged with establishing 'rapid response teams.' As the social action chair of the SoCal ACC [American Conference of Cantors] I am helping to coordinate some of these programs and Nancy Sidhu and Leone Hyman have gladly accepted the position of being our congregation's liaisons in this work. And our work together, has only just begun.

I would like to thank everyone who responded to my comments in last month's bulletin. gratifying to see the level of concern exhibited by our congregation. In response to the campaign rhetoric around immigration laws, the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC) has initiated a program. This week RAC conducted a webinar encouraging formation of a group within congregations that can educate us as to threats that may occur and appropriate responses thereto. Additionally, thev recommend establishing communication among local churches, mosques and synagogues so they are prepared to respond in a coordinated fashion. Our members Leone Hyman and Nancy Sidhu have generously agreed to take on this task for us. Furthermore, Cantor Bern-Vogel is coordinating the effort for the American Conference of Cantors in Los Angeles. I believe Redlands is ahead of the process as we already have the Redlands Area Interfaith Council, an organization in which Congregation Emanu El participates, in place. I believe the effort to educate our congregation internally and create external relationships with local faith-based groups will serve us well as we navigate what promises to be a rocky 2017.

Finally, I would like to remind everyone of two upcoming events. Sisterhood's Casino Night will take place January 28th at 6:00 PM at the temple. This is always an entertaining evening with many games of chance at which to try your luck. Then, on Sunday, February 12 at 4:00 PM, Cantor Bern-Vogel and friends present the annual Cantor's Concert. There will be a wide array of outstanding cantorial talent from around the country assembled for your enjoyment. Plan to attend and enjoy both evenings.

Our New Year's resolutions include: more sleep and relaxed rest; walks along canyon trails in the sun and under trees, or up and down the foothills of East Highland; music we love; deep conversations over tea; t'ai chi and dancing, that is, exercise we love to do; finding activities that relax and engage us, leave us with a smile afterward; singing together at Friday night services; and, as we did recently, joining Sisterhood for a morning of coloring and talking together; finding some stillness every day; deep breathing; deep breathing; deep breathing;


