Rabbinic Reflection



The High Holy Days present us with an interesting dichotomy. It is a time that we are guided to take a *cheshbon henefesh*, an accounting of the soul. The dichotomy comes in that we must do so both individually and communally. The Torah portion

that we read before Rosh Hashanah each year alludes to this power of the communal portion of this accounting. We read, "Atem Nitzavim Kolchem Hayom," ("You, ALL of you, together, stand before Me today"). When a community comes together as we did at Mount Sinai, the rabbis of old teach that a great power for good is released in the world, and it must be renewed in action, also known as doing *mitzvot*, every day.

Rosh Hashanah, through the sounding of the Shofar, serves as a wakeup call to the community to reminds us of what we have forgotten since we last stood at Mt. Sinai, that we are beings created in the image of God, each with a unique soul and a unique task in the world. Indeed, we must be reminded every day of our own Sinai moment. This takes place in daily prayer, no matter whether you do that in a formal or informal fashion. The Chassidic masters taught that this prayer rekindled our "Soul Light" each day. It is this "soul light" that drives us to do good in the world. This is the beauty of Judaism and its insistence on communal prayer. When we pray together, we create a sacred community in which we recognize the sacred and the unique in each and every one of us. We create new light, and with that new light we create new goodness in the world. We learn that the more we open our hearts to others the more we discover the depths of our own hearts, and the more we become witnesses of God's Presence in the world.

This Rosh Hashanah, may our community lift up your heart and help you to create more light in the world. May you have a good and sweet year, filled with the light that we share with each other.

Cantorial Comments



This past summer, I flew back and forth to Iowa three separate times spending several weeks with my 94-year old mother. Apart from enjoying sunshine, meals and cloud-gazing together, there were numerous trips to the ER from falls and other complications, medical visits and multiple discussions with doctors, assisted living staff and caregivers. After three weeks in

rehab, we made the decision to keep my mom in skilled nursing and just recently, have enlisted hospice care to help manage the pain from a wound in her leg that will not heal due to poor vascular circulation. Did I mention that my mom has dementia? We are grateful that she still recognizes Dan and me – is always happy to hear our voices in our daily phone calls and of course, is even happier if we're right there with her, but with the exception of a couple of other family members, close friends and her sister in London who calls once a week, my beloved mother doesn't remember much else.

My mom, born in Germany, a teenager on the *Kindertransport* to England in 1939, was once a bright, witty and articulate conversationalist – worked for the World Jewish Congress after the war, translated German articles into English, proofread in at least a dozen languages; now robbed her of those skills, it is sometimes a struggle to complete a single sentence. How does a person whose memory is vanishing, whose mind is no longer her own, who can longer find the words to cry out for help, be heard by God?

I think at times, speech eludes us all – we often grasp for the right words to express our pain, grief, fears, loneliness in our desire for our needs to be realized, our prayers to be answered... With Erev Rosh Hashanah commencing October 2, we continue the contemplative journey we began in the month of Elul to the next phase of celebrating the New Year 5777 with joy and gratitude; and Yom Kippur with reflection, forgiveness and hope. We plead with God, *Shema Koleinu* – hear our voices! Hear our cries! **Rabbi Uri of Strelisk** wrote: *Kol tuv*,

We pray that God may accept our call for help. But we also pray that God, who knows that which hidden, may hear the silent cries of our souls.

On Yom Kippur, we sing and recite the powerful prayer, *Unetaneh Tokef*, reflecting on the coming year: 'Who shall live and who shall die?' We so desperately want to hold on to life. The High Holy Days allow us to release our emotions, confront our mortality and vulnerability. At Sukkot we are reminded of the fragility of life when we read Kohelet and dwell in our lovely but sparse sukkah. With the Gates of Heaven still open, may we find comfort in Rabbi Milton Steinberg's words: "Only with God can we ease the intolerable tension of our existence. For only when God [He] is [present], can we hold life at once infinitely precious and yet as a thing lightly to be surrendered. Only because of God [Him] is it possible for us to clasp the world, but with relaxed hands; to embrace it, but with open arms." May we each be sealed in the Book of Life with

Treasurer's Report

L'shanah tovah tikatevu, is our traditional greeting for the new year. I would like share this greeting with all of you, my fellow

congregants, our greater community, stae, country and entire world. Certainly, we are all aware of the difficultly we are witnessing with so many people in a state of uncertainty. Hopefully, we will all be blessed with an inscription in the book of life for a good year as is our traditional request.

I want to share with you at this time, the commitment we have received from our bank, now Pacific Premier Bank formally Security Bank of California, that will provide us with significant cash flow relief for the coming seven years. Your Board of Directors hap approved the use of certain trust funds to reduce the current mortgage obligation. As many of you know, the investment climate if offering very poor returns of safe investments and it was agreed with the donors an trustees that the investments should be used to reduce our obligation on the mortgage thus saving the cost of interest on the mortgage which would generate more income through the difference between the investment income and the reduced outflow of interest expense.

That said, we will be refinancing our mortgage before the end of the calendar year thus reducing the need for mortgage reduction fund (MRF). while we certainly will continue to accept contributions to the MjRF, those contributions will be applied directly to reduce the principal obligation and not to the interest cost. This will allow us to pay off the mortgage sooner. Further, Pacific Premier Bank agreed to reduce the interest rate from 3.99% to 3.25%. That alone will reduce our annual cost by more than \$11,000.00.

We are not "out of the woods" yet, but we have made a substantial move that will relieve significant pressure on our cash flow. That in turn will enable us to offer more programs and hopefully attract more members. The Board of Directors will be keeping you informed as we move forward in the coming year.

May this year was an exciting month. All around were people sporting green ribbons for mental health awareness. A gorgeous awareness banner graced our Patricia/Ford corner. And our Friday evening services became a time for thinking and learning about mental illness. Not only did Rabbi Sherwood and Cantor Bern-Vogel speak beautifully on how Torah guides us as we consider our responsibilities, but congregants spoke every week about how mental illness impacts their own lives. Please go to our Emanu El website www.emanuelsb.org where you will find all of the talks given during May there for you to look at again or read for the first time.

And over some months of the past year, we participated in a webinar series created by the Union of Reform Judaism designed to help congregations include people with mental illness in our community life. The entire series is online at www.disabilitiesinclusion.org in the mental health section. In Isaiah 56:7, the Lord says "I will bring them to my holy mount.....My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples."

We thank every single person who has helped us become more aware and inclusive in our own community of Congregation Emanu El. We thank every single person who has opened up their hearts, who have been brave, who have taken steps, never easy, to teach us and offer love and acceptance to everyone. AN IMPORTANT UP-DATE FROM OUR HOME OF ETERNITY CEMETERY

The Home of Eternity Cemetery and Mausoleum is an integral part of Congregation Emanu El. It is an historic site but more importantly it is a sacred site, the burial place of the pioneers of our community, our fellow-congregants, and our own loved ones and friends. The cemetery is operated for the congregation by a Board of Managers. We welcome Les Kushner as a new member of the Board of Managers. Continuing to serve are Rabbi Hillel Cohn (chairperson), Gloria Cutler, Jim Gaunt, Shelley Silver, Julie Strain, David Swedlove, and Greg Weissman.

While our cemetery has unfortunately experienced periodic episodes of vandalism over the years the problem became especially acute in the spring of 2016. A growing number of homeless people established "encampments" at Seccombe Lake which is just a block south of our cemetery. While there was a Homeless Access center at Seccombe Lake where homeless could obtain water and take showers, those facilities were only available Monday through Friday from 9:00 am to 2:30pm. Additionally, the city, because of financial constraints, decided to discontinue all irrigation at Pioneer Memorial Cemetery which is located just south of our cemetery and just north of Seccombe Lake. This prompted a number of homeless, vagrants and transients to enter our cemetery during the night hours, despite it being gated, to find shelter as well as to avail themselves of our facilities. In addition to using inordinate amounts of water they vandalized our mausoleum area, left large amounts of trash on our grounds and created a real nuisance. We were able to receive permission from the City of San Bernardino to install "razor-wire" along the entire 375 foot fence between our cemetery and Pioneer Cemetery. This has significantly cut down on the number of trespassers.

At our urging the city has restored water access at Seccombe Lake and irrigation at Pioneer Memorial Cemetery as well as having moved almost all of the homeless to some other areas in the city.

While the "razor-wire" reduced the number of trespassers In order to gain access some of the vagrants destroyed slats in the wrought-iron fence. These have been replaced as needed. To enhance the security of our cemetery we were advised to plant 80 "security-cactus" along the 375 feet. This has been done and it is projected that these security cacti will be grown to full height within the next 3-4 months and thus further protect our cemetery grounds from trespassers. They will also add some real beauty to our grounds.

We can report that these two measures have reduced the number of trespassers. Within the next few months we believe we have will totally eliminated the problem.

A second project at Home of Eternity has been the refurbishing of two areas that had been installed in 2008 adjacent to the mausoleum. Through the generosity of the Raynes family two fountains were installed to add to the beauty of the area. Those fountains when operative required monthly maintenance similar to that required by a swimming pool, increased our electric and water bills significantly and turned out to be an "attractive nuisance" to trespassers. Within a year or two of their installation vandals stole all of the electric wire servicing the cemetery. During the time that there was no electricity available the mechanical equipment of the "fountains" disintegrated and trespassers essentially ruined the fountains. When electric wiring was restored to the cemetery it was deemed impractical to return the fountains to their operating status. Over the past couple of months these fountains, with the approval of the donors, have been refurbished and converted into attractive planters with drought-resistant plants. This has eliminated maintenance costs and changed what had become an "attractive nuisance" to trespassers into a lovely area surrounding the mausoleum.

Unfortunately in April 2016 our equipment building suffered a break-in and almost all of our tools and equipment were stolen. While insurance replaced a substantial amount of the tools and equipment there was a deductible which the cemetery has had to absorb.

Additionally, over a period of time sprinkler valves and stations have required replacement as well.

All of these measures to improve the security of our cemetery have been extremely costly. The installation of the "razor-wire", the refurbishing of the fountain-planters, the planting of security cactus and the replacement of needed equipment have severely taxed our financial resources. Fortunately, a solicitation in early 2016 for the renewal of memberships in the Home of Eternity Society yielded approximately \$8,000.00 but all of this as well as a small reserve fund are now depleted. We hope that there will be some who will decide to do their own pre-need planning and purchase graves, crypt or niches for later use and thus provide a stream of income to the cemetery.
