Rabbinic Reflections



Seven Days for Renewal A student at a small school of Jewish learning was asked to lead services for Rosh Hashanah. The student spent hours preparing. One morning the young person, walking with head buried in the prayer book and without

watching the path, bumped into the rabbi.

The rabbi said, "What are you doing?" The student replied, "I am reviewing every word of the prayer book." The rabbi smiled and said, "The prayer book has not changed since last year, if you want to grow take time and review yourself."

The High Holy Days represent our time for renewal as individuals and as a community. We take stock of our lives, work to repair relationships, and seek ways to bring wholeness to the world. In Jewish tradition, Rosh Hashanah is called, "*Hayom HaRat Olam* – The Day of the World's Creation." In the Torah God created light on the first day, and spiritual teachers believe there is a spark of Divine light in every soul.

Jewish communities begin spiritual preparation for the Holy Days as early as a month before Rosh Hashanah. Based on teachings about Divine light, I would like to offer a guide for renewal based on the Seven Days of Creation:

"Let there be light." What is the unique light of my soul? What are my talents, insights about life, and joys, I cherish for myself and give to others?

"Let there be a division amidst the waters." What are barriers that I have created or that have developed that conceal the light of my spirit? From whom do I need to seek forgiveness and whom do I need to forgive?

"Let the earth sprout seed bearing plants." What are the seeds of new beginning I can take to restore the light of my heart?

"Let there be lights in the space of the sky." A Hasidic sage said that the mightiest person who is in prison cannot release him or herself. Even a child with a key can open the strongest of locks. Who are the people that help restore the light to my life?

"Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and birds that fly above the earth." What are my dolphins and my eagles? What are my dreams I once imagined or things I have always wanted to do?

"Let us make humans in the Divine image." The value of *Tikkun Olam* says the world is broken and humanity must work with God for healing. What will I do to fulfill my responsibilities to the world and other children of God?

Shabbat: God blessed the seventh day and called it holy. What will I do each week to renew my body, restore relationships with those I

love, and reaffirm my spiritual being?

May you, your family, friends, and our world be blessed with a year of renewal, health, happiness, and peace!

Cantorial Comments



Return again...and renew in our time the days of old...born and reborn again....chadesh yameinu k'kedem... We are on the brink of a New Year – unlike the fireworks and champagne of the secular new year,

ours is spiritually challenging and introspective. The days of the month of Elul that started at the end of August leading up to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, are reminders of the opportunity we have to self-examine and re-evaluate our intentions – *cheshbon hanefesh*; yes, it is about our actions over the past year – words we uttered that we may regret, behaviors we wish we could have changed – but it is also about recognizing that change or returning - *t'shuvah* - to the right path is not easy.

On Rosh Chodesh Elul (our special Brit Olam evening in August) we began by singing 'Return Again', the haunting melody that serves as a refrain throughout the High Holy Days. The liturgical focus is also on the familiar prayer Hashiveinu Adonai elecha v'nashuvah – Take us back, Adonai – let us come back to you – Renew in our time the days of old; let us be reborn again and give us strength to continue to grow personally and as a community.

On Shabbat morning, September 9th, I look forward to sharing the *bema* with Rabbi Crystal as we incorporate some of the melodies, hopes and meditations of Elul leading up to *Selichot* and the *Yamim Noraim* – the Days of Awe. Throughout these remaining days of Elul, the daily recitation of the words of Psalm 27 reflect an inner confidence and serenity that foster hope in the midst of distress and worry....

"Adonai Ori v'yish'i - mimi ira? Adonai is my light and my refuge secure - Whom shall I fear?God is the stronghold of my life – of whom should I be afraid? Just one thing I have asked of God; only this do I seek: to dwell in God's House all the days of my life, to behold divine sweetness and beauty, and to gaze in delight at God's Temple."

Presidential Perspectives



Perhaps nothing in Jewish life exhibits the importance of peace more than the fact that nearly every major Jewish prayer – the Amidah, Kaddish, Grace after Meals - conclude with an appeal for peace. So, how do we find peace as our country and its people continue to reel from the events last month in

Charlottesville, Virginia.

This small college town became the backdrop for a "Unite the Right" rally. Three people died and thirty more were injured when opposing groups clashed; a thirty-two year old woman was killed after a car slammed into a crowd of protesters. Two state troopers died when their helicopter crashed while monitoring the protest from above. All over the country people marched condemning the violence from neo-Nazis groups while working to somehow convert the violence and hate filled rhetoric to a tone of peace and unity. We've seen it before; hate rises and on its heals compassionate people work to alter the moment and the The Jewish people know conversation. oppression and hatred all too well. We've seen anti-semitism used as a tool to try and tear apart the very fabric our people. Yet, somehow, someway we rise above and persevere to a peaceful path where tolerance and compassion lead the way.

As we prepare for our upcoming High Holy Days we are mindful of the racism and anti-semitism which continues to plague our world. Strides have indeed been made in educating and enlightening our society, yet we are constantly reminded that there is still so much work to be done.

Rabbi Sharon Brous of the Los Angeles Synagogue IKAR says as individuals; "We can't do everything, but each of us can do something". The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) issued a challenge for our congregational community to "Be the Light". Be the light by condemning bigotry and hatred. Be the light by standing up for what is right and just. I'm proud to say Congregation Emanu El has been working to *Be the Light* through its *Brit Olam*: The World We Want Covenant, a local and global initiative pledging to bring the issues of social justice to the center of congregational life. This pledge of *Brit Olam* preaches peace and understanding for all, which could not be more timely.

May these High Holy Days remind us that there is always something that each of us can do to "*Be the Light*". Take a stand – raise your voice for peace, tolerance and understanding; or perhaps do something as simple as greet a perfect stranger with an infectious smile and a gentle "Hello".

Nelson Mandela said: "No one is born hating another person because of the color of his skin, his background or religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love."

Let us pray this hateful, racist mindset ends and may the ignorant somehow find their way to a place of *Teshuvah*, where awareness of wrong gives way to enlightenment, leading to a path of peace, repentance and self-awareness.

I continue to have great faith in our collective Human Community made up of so many different narratives, religions and skin tones. May each of *us* strive to "*Be the Light*" by living good, decent and meaningful lives which allow peace to prevail over hate and bigotry. Indeed, we cannot do *everything*, but *each* of us can do *something*. Let's all "*Be the Light*" together to make our world a better, more peaceful place, as we embark on this – God willing- sweet New Year.

Treasurer's Report



Dear Fellow Congregants,

Shanah Tovah to you and your loved ones. May you be inscribed in the Book of Life for health and happiness in the New Year.

We have completed our first month of our fiscal year and as in past years, fell short of our budgeted cash

receipts. I would hope you can find it possible to complete your pledged dues obligation by remitting at least the obligation for July and August so we do not impair our reserves for the future.

We have given a lot of thought to our budget for the year and have eliminated any expenditures that are not truly necessary for the basic operations. That said, we were fortunate in seeking to repair our air conditioning that rather than having to replace a compressor at over \$10,000, we were able to determine the cause of the failure and by correctly repairing the system, only incur about \$1,700. These types of emergency repairs are not budgeted so we end up into our reserve funds.

I know that as in the past you will step up and assist us, by catching up any arrearages. As always, we appreciate your commitment to our Congregation.

Mental Health Awareness Shame

When was the last time someone smiled, or snickered, at you, and announced to everyone present – "Your face is red!" Did you feel caught, found out? Maybe you looked around to see how everyone was reacting. And maybe your face turned redder. You could just feel the extra heat.

We don't talk much about shame, though we all know it. And for some of us, for many different reasons, we are ashamed of something basic about ourselves. And that has to be a hardly tolerable feeling. So, we hide our natures. Our families and partners hide them, too. Or maybe there's something in your life you can't control – an addiction, a part of you that keeps dragging you down. You want to show the world that you are smart, strong, full of vigor and purpose, but there's a secret barrier to that life. You keep it secret.

If we could all remember how awful shame feels and how powerful it is, we might have a lot more compassion for every one of us who hides drug addiction, alcoholism, a mental disorder, a long-standing guilt, or whatever our minds tell us to be ashamed of. We might help each other pass through the hot red face, and open up. Because that's the good secret of recovery, the good secret of an easier life.

As we enter *Elul* and prepare for our New Year, our Days of Awe, we can decide to help those we know and help ourselves move beyond shame to honesty and a better world.

And one way to exercise your stigma free support is by becoming a sponsor of the Inland Empire NAMI Walk in October in Hemet. NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness, is always supporting people with mental illness and their families. Look for NAMI Walks 2017 on their website.

The Joseph Dilemma:

People We Hate to Love & Love to Hate



Nemesis, adversary, pain-in-the-neck, rival, ... We all have them; people who we find difficult. In some cultures these conflicts escalate to feuds or vendettas. As a synagogue community we need a different path; our question as people of faith is how do we respond to these people?

The story of Joseph, his actions and the brothers' response, is the Torah's paradigmatic "difficult person dilemma." We will learn strategies to affirm the Divine in every person and respond to people we find difficult with compassion. We will explore the thought of the Rabbis from 200CE, the Hasidic sage Rabbi Nachman of Bratslav, and modern teachers.

Tashlich on the Afternoon of Rosh Hashanah



All are invited to participate in the Tashlich ceremony that is held on the afternoon of the 1st Day of Rosh Hashanah. *Tashlich* ("you shall cast out") is a tradition that de-

veloped in the Middle Ages. Our ancestors began the practice of walking to the banks of a river or some other body of water on the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah. There, with the recitation of prayers, they would empty their pockets and shake their clothing free of the sins they believed had accumulated there during the previous year. Often they would toss bread crumbs which symbolically represented the sins they wanted to cast off.

Tashlich will be held on Thursday, September 21st at 4:30 pm at Ford Park which is just a few blocks from the temple. Rabbi Crystal and Cantor Bern-Vogel will lead this brief informal service which includes singing and activities. We encourage you to come dressed casually – preferably in white clothing. You can bring a few bread crumbs to cast into the water. This is a wonderful opportunity for families to join together in a time-honored Jewish tradition.

Kever Avot Service At Our Cemetery During the High Holy Days



It is a long-standing cherished tradition to visit the graves of loved ones during the High Holy Day period. This is known as *Kever Avot* (literally, the graves of the ancestors). At this service special memorial prayers are recited and the rabbi delivers a brief message that stresses the importance of honoring the memories of loved ones

Kever Avot will be held on Sunday, September 24th at 1:30 pm at our Home of Eternity Cemetery, 8th and Sierra Way, San Bernardino. While this service memorializes those buried or entombed at our historic cemetery, it is certainly appropriate for all to attend, even if their loved ones are buried elsewhere. At the end of the service those attending can go to the graves or crypts of loved ones for individual memorial prayers. Rabbi Crystal and Rabbi Cohn will be there to share those prayers with you.

A New Look

Outside and Inside

Over the last couple of months two wonderful improvements have been made to our synagogue building. The exterior metallic art work of our congregations logo which includes a tree and the Hebrew words for "Emanu El" now also has the name of our temple in English. This enables visitors to know what our building houses.

And most recently two beautiful and functional lecterns have been placed on our *bema*. They replace the temporary table and reading stands that have been in use since the temple was in its temporary facilities and since our new building was completed. It had been hoped to acquire the lecterns - one for the rabbi and one for the cantor - but funds were not available to do that. The new lecterns enable those seated in the congregation to have an unobstructed view of our beautiful Holy Ark. Another lovely lectern, replacing one that has been in use for more than 25 years and which has been in need of replacement, has been acquired for use in our Social Hall.

The congregation is most grateful to Rabbi Hillel and Rita Cohn for providing the funding for these new acquisitions as well as a new museum display case to house our valuable collection of ritual objects.
