Weekly Shabbat Eve Services to Start at 7:30 pm

This year the observance of Independence Day and Erev Shabbat coincide. So, this is a time for a special celebration and we will have that special

celebration at Congregation Emanu El.

After you have relaxed on the 4th of July, come to the temple with your picnic dinner. You can choose either to have your picnic outdoors on the temple grounds or indoors (cool and 'bug-free") in the Social Hall. The Picnic will begin at 6:30 pm. Then at 7:30 we will gather in the sanctuary for our Shabbat service, quite a bit more informal than usual. It will include the singing of our favorite patriotic songs as well as prayers expressing our love for America. In place of a sermon we will listen to "The Ballad for Americans" sung by the famed Paul Robeson, a magnificent musical statement on the true meaning of America. Following the service



we will gather for an Oneg Shabbat with the most traditional of American desserts - apple pie a la mode with plenty of ice cream and pie to go around. And then, having filled ourselves spiritually and

physically we will take our chairs outside and watch the fireworks show from the University of Redlands. Our temple campus will give us a great view of that festive display.

Even if you can't join us for the picnic dinner, come to the service and join us as we watch the fireworks.

And - to help set the mood of celebrating Shabbat and the 4th of July you are encouraged to come dressed very casually and, if possible, to wear patriotic colors.

Mental Health Awareness In Action

Did you know that at least 75% of people with a mental illness report that they have experienced stigma? Stigma is a mark of disgrace that sets a person apart. Stigma brings feelings of shame and blame, misrepresentation in the media, a reluctance to seek or accept necessary help and contributes to social discrimination of people who have mental illness

Did you know that the best treatments for serious mental illnesses today are highly effective? Between 70 and 90 percent of individuals have significant reduction of symptoms and improved quality of life with a combination of pharmacological and pyschosocial treatments and supports.

A fine group of congregants led by Nancy Sidhu. Heidi Nimmo and Larry Mink are leading an effort to educate our entire congregation about mental illness - what it really means to people and what are the difficulties of dealing with it. Our recently organized Mental Health Awareness In Action Committee is committed to creating actions to help eliminate the stigma of mental illness. They are in the process of developing a series of programs that will enable us to take concrete steps to address this concern. This is a part of true *Tikun Olam, repairing of the world*.

We invite youth and adults to a meeting on Thursday, July 10th at 7:00 pm in the temple social hall to learn more about the stigmas about mental illness that still, unfortunately, prevail. Troy Mondragon will speak to us on how he deals with his mental health issues. He is currently a graduate student in the College of Social Sciences at Cal State San Bernardino and is a member of County of San Bernardino Behavioral Health Commission.

Please make a special effort to attend the meeting on Thursday, July 10th at 7:00 pm to learn more about this effort. Your presence will be an important first step in helping banish the stigma of mental illness.

President's Award Presented to Phyllis Sweet



At the temple's annual meeting held in May the President's Award was presented to Phyllis Sweet. The President's Award is given each year to a member who has distinguished herself or himself by performing exceptional volunteer activities.

Welcome Back Rabbi Hillel Cohn

While Rabbi Hillel Cohn is well-known to many of our congregants there are those in our congregational family who do not really know him and his long history with our congregation.

Rabbi Cohn came to serve Congregation Emanu El in 1963 after having been ordained at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati. He came to us to serve as the assistant rabbi to Rabbi Norman Feldheym. After a year he was named as co-rabbi and in 1971, upon the retirement of Rabbi Feldheym he became the senior rabbi of the congregation. He served as our rabbi for 38 years, retiring in 2001 when he was named Rabbi Emeritus.

Our rabbi is known throughout the Inland Empire as one of the leading religious leaders. He has been active in many community organizations over the years. He served as president of Family Service Agency of San Bernardino, president of the San Bernardino Area Mental Health Association and on the boards of dozens of organizations. Currently he is a member of the board of the St. Bernardine Medical Center Foundation. The Community Foundation of Riverside and San Bernardino, Planned Parenthood of Orange and Bernardino Counties, Brightest Star, Unforgettables Foundation, THINK Together Inland Advisory Board, Morrow-McCombs Memorial Lecture Advisory Board and the Cal State San Bernardino College of Social and Behavioral Sciences Development Council. He is also a member of the Institutional Review Board of Arrowhead Regional Medical Center and a member of the Diocesan Health Care Committee of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Bernardino.

In 2010 Rabbi Cohn served as the Chairperson of the San Bernardino Bicentennial Committee and led the observance of San Bernardino's 200th anniversary. He currently serves as an appointed member of the Human Relations Commission and as a member of the Citizen's Charter Review Committee.

He was the founding chairperson of the Inland and Desert Hillel Council and just recently completed a second term as its chairperson. Rabbi Cohn was a national officer of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, is a past president of the Pacific Association of Reform Rabbis and in 2010 served as the national president of NAORRR, the National Association of Retired Reform Rabbis. He served for five years as editor of the CCAR monthly newsletter and for the past five years has been the editor of Ohr L'Naorrr, the publication of NAORRR.

Rabbi Cohn is a past president of Paradise Lodge of B'nai B'rith and a past chairperson of the San Bernardino United Jewish Welfare Fund.

For the past two years he has served as the Interim Chairperson of the Board of Managers of our Home of Eternity Cemetery.

Rabbi Cohn has received many honors during the course of his rabbinic career. In 1996 he was selected as one of 5,000 Hometown Heroes to carry the Olympic Torch. In recent years he has been honored by Inland Congregations United for Change, the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Bernardino, the Time for Change Foundation, California State University San Bernardino, the Inland African-American Churches and many more. He has the distinction of being the only rabbi to have been invited three times to deliver the opening prayer for the United States Congress.

In the early days of his rabbinate in our congregation he was in charge of our educational program and was twice honored with the Emanuel Gamoran Memorial Award of the National Association of Temple Educators for creating the best new religious school curriculum in the United States. He holds the title of Reform Jewish Educator, a distinction conferred on him by the reform movement. His sermons have been published regularly and he is the author of various liturgical publications including a Haggadah for Passover.

Rabbi Cohn is well known for his appearances on the media. For a number of years he was one of the regular participants on "Religion On The Line", a popular talk-show on KABC radio. He produced and hosted a series of 50 half-hour programs on "The Many Faces of San Bernardino." Currently he is one of the three participants on "A Jew, a Muslim and a Christian" seen world-wide through Wordnet TV.

Rabbi Cohn was born in Berlin, Germany and was brought to this country as an infant by his

parents who were refugees from Nazi Germany. He was raised in the Pacific Northwest and Los Angeles. He received his undergraduate degree in Political Science from UCLA and attended the Hebrew Union College in Los Angeles and Cincinnati where he was ordained. He has also earned a Doctor of Ministry degree from The Claremont School of Theology as well as an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from the Hebrew Union College.

Rabbi Cohn and his wife Rita are the proud parents of two children - Elana Cohn-Rozansky who lives in Lake Oswego, OR and Marc Cohn who resides in Vista. They are the grandparents of Jeremy and Adam Rozansky and Sarah and Leah Cohn.

Our congregation is truly honored to have our locally and nationally respected rabbi return to lead us and appreciates his having volunteered to serve us this coming year. In addition to serving us he will continue to serve as the rabbi of the Sun City Jewish Services in Palm Desert. He will be officiating at their Erev Shabbat services on the 1st and 3rd Friday of each month as well as the High Holy Days, a commitment he made prior to his offering to return to be our rabbi.

"Shul by the Pool" on July 18th



Introducing Rabbi Jordan Ofseyer



We are honored that Rabbi Jordan Ofseyer has accepted our invitation to serve as our Guest Rabbi for the forthcoming High Holy Days. Rabbi Ofseyer is a most distinguished rabbi and we look forward to his participation in our

services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and to his sermons on those sacred days.

Rabbi Ofseyer has served as the senior rabbi of some of the leading congregations in our country such as Shearith Israel in Dallas, Texas and more recently at Temple Isaiah in Palm Springs and Temple Sinai in Palm Desert. He has also served as adjunct professor of theology and history at Mt. Holyoke College in Massachusetts, Southern Methodist University in Dallas and the University of Judaism/American Jewish University in Los Angeles.

For a number of years Rabbi Ofseyer has been a panelist on the nationally broadcast interfaith program "American Religious Town Hall", a program that is see world wide and can be see on the internet at american religious.org.

Rabbi Ofseyer holds the distinction of being one of very few rabbis to have received three degrees from the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York. He earned degrees in Jewish education, was commissioned as a Cantor and was ordained as a rabbi. He did his undergraduate work at Columbia University. He is a member of the Rabbinical Assembly, the international organization of conservative rabbis, and has held numerous leadership positions in that organization.

Rabbi Ofseyer and his wife Veda have four children and four grandchildren and reside in Rancho Mirage.

In addition to leading our services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, Rabbi Ofseyer will lead the Erev Shabbat service on September 19th which will give him and the congregation a fine opportunity to meet prior to the High Holy Days.

Home of Eternity Cemetery

Our Home of Eternity Cemetery is the oldest Jewish cemetery in continuous existence in Southern California. It began in the early 1850's when a plot of ground was given to the Jewish community by a group of early Mormon pioneers. The first adults were buried in our cemetery in the early 1860's. Over the course of time additional ground was added to our cemetery and a mausoleum and columbarium was built as well.

Today our cemetery is the only functioning all-Jewish cemetery in San Bernardino and Riverside counties.

The cemetery is a sacred trust of Congregation Emanu El. We are committed to its upkeep and beautification so that it can continue to serve as a burial place for our loved ones. It is operated on behalf of the temple by a Board of Managers. We are pleased to announce that the new chairperson of the Board of Managers as of July 1st is David Swedlove. He succeeded Rabbi Hillel Cohn who served as the interim chairperson for the past two years. Current members of the Board of Managers in addition to David Swedlove and Rabbi Cohn are Skip Borsuk, Gloria Cutler, Shelley Silver, Bill Simon, Julie Strain and Greg Weissman.

We want to remind our members and friends that it is wise to make ones burial arrangements well in advance of need. You can select either ground burial graves, mausoleum crypts or columbarium niches. The cemetery enables you to make your selection and to pay it over a period up to five years at no-interest.

If you wish to discuss the selection and purchase of burial space at our Home of Eternity Cemetery please call the temple office and let us know of your interest. A member of the Board of Managers will be happy to meet with you at the cemetery and show you the available spaces. Members of Congregation Emanu El or any other recognized synagogue receive a generous (25%) discount on all spaces.
