

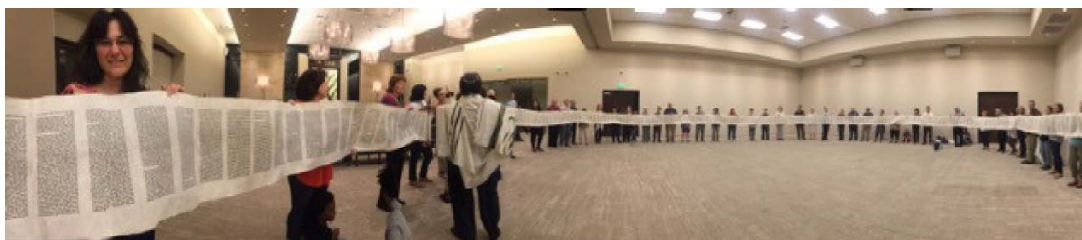

Rabbinic Reflections



November is the month of Thanksgiving, a holiday that is quintessentially American, that celebrates an idea that is quintessentially Jewish—the idea of gratitude. In fact, gratitude, or giving thanks, is in our name. The reason that we are called Jews is because biblically, we are descended from the tribe of Judah. The

biblical patriarch Jacob had 12 children, often referenced as the fathers of 12 tribes of Israel. Our biblical narrative tells us that 10 of the tribes were lost, dispersed among the nations and no longer identifiable. The remaining tribes, the very large tribe of Judah and the much smaller tribe of Benjamin, became the progenitors of the Jewish people. Since the majority tribe was Judah, we acquired the name Jews—the people of Judah.

So what does this name mean? When Leah gave birth to Judah she said, "This time I will give thanksgiving unto the Lord; therefore she called his name Judah" (Genesis 29:35) - from the Hebrew verb *hoday*, giving thanks. When Leah called her son Judah, she hoped that the soul of her child as well as those who would descend from him would embody the name, becoming a people of gratitude.

Indeed, this is who we have become. The Rabbis of the Talmud explain that we are to say 100 *b'rachot* (blessings) every day (Tractate Menachot 43b). That is 100 opportunities to give thanks—100 opportunities to live the name that describes who we are.

British author Aldous Huxley observed keenly that, "Most human beings have an almost infinite capacity for taking things for granted." The Talmudic requirement for 100 daily blessings is our mandate to act differently. The origins of Thanksgiving are steeped in this very idea. In 1621, when the early colonists celebrated their bounty in Plymouth, they recalled the Fall harvest festival of Sukkot as accounted in the Torah, using it as the basis for the first American Thanksgiving.

To combine the Jewish and American ideals of Thanksgiving, at your Thanksgiving dinner this year, you might offer some traditional words of gratitude from our Jewish tradition:

Psalm 100

A Psalm of thanksgiving. Shout to Adonai, all the earth.

Serve Adonai with gladness; come before God's presence with singing.

Know that Adonai is God; God that made us, and we are God's people, the flock of God's pasture.

Enter God's gates with thanksgiving, and into God's courtyards with praise; give thanks to God, and bless God's name.

For Adonai is good; God's mercy endures forever; and God's faithfulness is for all generations.

Cantorial Comments



If you take a look at the Jewish calendar, you'll see that this November is divided between the last half of the month of Cheshvan and the first half of Kislev. Cheshvan is the only month with no Jewish holidays – something of a relief after bidding farewell to *Tishrei* and the High Holy Day season. That

actually calls for a celebration! But as you can see, *Kislev* is coming up soon...even if they don't know any other Hebrew months, most Jewish children know that *Kislev* heralds the holiday of *Hanukkah*! In American culture, the month of November has become a time to share sentiments of gratitude, common goals and understanding across the denominations – this year we can look forward to several Interfaith services in honor of the Thanksgiving holiday, with community church choirs and the Congregation Emanu El choir joining together in praise and psalms – a time to meet and greet old and new friends.

I recently was reminded of a concept which I find quite thought-provoking. Rabbi Rachel Cowen and Dr. Linda Thal, in their book called *Wise Aging*, write that "blessings in general remind us to be grateful. Beyond adequate food, shelter, and health, relationships are often our greatest treasure." If we haven't seen someone for a long time [traditionally thirty days] this occasion merits reciting the *Shehecheyanu* prayer. In contemporary society, it is not unusual *not* to see a good friend for several months or even years. This does not include email, texting or other social media. As far as a blessing, you may find this as startling as I, that for a friend we may not have seen for over a year, we recite the traditional prayer from the Amida *Baruch ata Adonai, El oheinu melech ha'olam, m'cheyei hameitim* which translates to **Blessed are you, Adonai our God, who reigns sovereign in the universe, Who revives the dead!** The holidays are a time for gatherings and reunions, sometimes with people who may have been absent from our life over an extended period. Perhaps there are relationships that are actually 'dead' to you that you may want to revive? And why not offer a *Shehecheyanu* upon greeting a friend you haven't seen in awhile? Even if you see them often, it may be time to tell them how important they actually are to you. And you don't even need a holiday for that!

Treasurer's Report



Friends,

The month of September generally represents a turning point for the congregation. As leaves begin to fall in other parts of the country, our income begins to fall as well as we stop seeing a surge from families who pay their commitments all at

once. September represents our first opportunity to see how the year will look in general. I'm sorry to say, there are some very real concerns beginning to show.

For the second month in a row, income outpaced expenses, but there is a much smaller gap between the two. Our income of \$54,000 is down significantly from August, which we expect, but expenses of \$48,000 per month mean that our cushion is rapidly disappearing. Mortgage retirement fund income did not meet our expectations once again and SJL tuition is sincerely behind budget. As we look toward the end of the year, I hope every family will look at their yearly tax planning, and if there is any room for tax-deductible charitable giving - why give it to Uncle Sam when you can give it to the congregation?

At the moment, I forecast that the month of October will see a small surplus as many members fulfill their Kol Nidre pledges, and let me take this opportunity to thank each and every person who answered the call with kindness and generosity. As one of the callers, it brightens my heart to think of the generosity shown to the congregation. In every way, we are one big family and it's heartwarming when we all pull together in support of a common goal.

Please allow me this time to thank the members of your board of directors and executive committee who have been tasked with finding innovative solutions to keeping our future bright. For those who attended our congregational meeting, you heard our President talk about a future filled with happiness and security and I can assure you that we are all working hard to make that happen. I would also like to thank our Financial Secretary, Steve Becker, who has the unenviable task of working with members in financial need. Honestly, I am in awe of First VP Cheryl Sukenik and Past President Julie Strain who are building the scrip program up even higher and making it easier for you to support Congregation Emanu El. Please use temple scrip whenever possible.

Those who know me will tell you that I'm rarely accused of being an optimist, but I have unbroken faith that our congregation will stand strong in the face of future financial challenges with good spirits and generosity, and that our grandchildren will look back upon these days with pride and say, "They sacrificed so that we can stand here today."

Mental Health Awareness



King Saul threw himself onto his own sword, as it says in I Samuel 31. Thus in the midst of a battle, he killed himself. A suicide by a man to whom the Lord had sent an evil spirit to terrify

him (I Samuel 16). This suicide happened a long time ago, and in its modern forms, is happening all the time around us in probably every country. Is there anyone of us who doesn't know someone who died by his or her own hand, or the family of such a person? Suicide is about the 11th most common cause of death in the US, and about 2 ½ percent of Americans think about suicide in any given year. It's quite common among young people, and among men, those over 75 years old have the highest rate of suicide. We need to know how to ease the difficulties of those who might be tending toward killing themselves. David helped King Saul by sitting with him and playing his lyre. Saul would find relief and the evil spirit would leave him. The king liked David and felt comforted. Sometimes something as simple as companionship and music might help, if only for the moment. There were no further remedies for King Saul. We have professional help and medications. But we need to be able to recognize a burgeoning problem. Here are a few signs:*

- Actual threats of self-harm
- Actions to get weapons or pills or find other means of suicide
- Talking or writing about dying and suicide
- Expressing hopelessness
- Great anger, seeking revenge
- Reckless actions

If you see someone you know with some of these feelings and actions, talk to him or her. Just ask if she or he is thinking about suicide. And listen deeply to what the person says. Then help him or her get the help that's needed. Remember that you are part of the help she needs. Your caring, open heart is part of what will make the "evil spirit" leave him. Or as we moderns might say, help the chemicals in the brain come into a healthier balance. What could be better than saving a life?

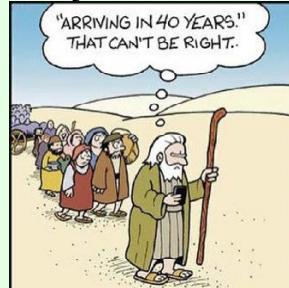

Camperships!

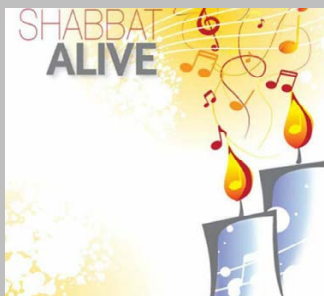

Shabbat Alive Dinner & Service Friday, November 6, 2015



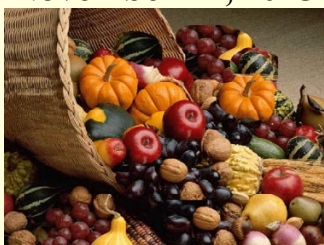
Shabbat Alive is a community dinner followed by a participatory, musical Shabbat service in the round.

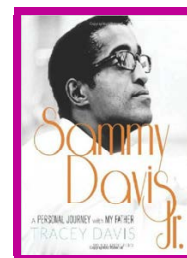

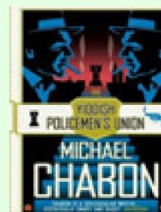

The Yiddish Policemen's Union



The Yiddish Policemen's Union is a 2007 novel by American author Michael Chabon. The novel is a detective story set in an alternative history version of the present day, based on the premise that during World War II, a temporary settlement for Jewish refugees was established in Sitka, Alaska, in 1941, and that the fledgling State of Israel was destroyed in 1948. The novel is set in Sitka, which it depicts as a large, Yiddish-speaking metropolis.
