Rabbinic Reflections



It is now the month of Elul, signaling that it is time to begin our preparations for the New Year, and reminding us that the High Holy Days season is upon us. It is during this time of year that we take a *cheshbon hanefesh*, an accounting of the soul. What does it mean to take an

accounting of our soul? Perhaps the answer lies in one of the sections of the Torah that we will read on the second day of Rosh Hashanah--the story of the binding of Isaac from the Book of Genesis.

The story is familiar to most. God tells Abraham to take his son Isaac to a mountain a few days journey away, and offer him up to God as a sacrifice. As he prepares to kill his son on the alter, an angel stops Abraham and directs him to use a ram instead, which Abraham conveniently finds in a nearby thicket. There have been volumes written on this strange test of faith. Rabbis have made careers composing sermons that analyze the text from every viewpoint imaginable. I offer one of these perspectives to address the question of how we account for our souls at this time of year.

The 11th century commentator Rashi points out that God does not actually command Abraham to "slaughter" his son Isaac on the alter, but rather God instructs Abraham to "offer him up"; a rather ambiguous command. Taking note of Rashi's observation, the Ishbitzer Rebbe, a 19th century Chasidic master, suggests that God sent Abraham on a three day journey to the mountain because God wanted Abraham to struggle with this question. Once God communicated to Abraham the initial command, there was no further communication between God and Abraham that would clarify what Abraham was meant to do when he arrived at the mountain! Abraham had to figure it out on his own. Perhaps, the Ishbitzer observes, this is because life is not about God telling us what to do; it is more about us struggling with what God wants us to do. and with who God wants us to be.

And so, as we quickly move forward toward the year 5776, I wish you a good struggle. May your struggle lead you to take your own *cheshbon hanefesh*, an accounting of your soul. May you struggle with what God wants you to do, and with what you want to do; with who God wants you to be and with whom you want to be. And in that struggle, may you find a reconciliation of your spiritual accounts. Shanah Tovah!

Cantorial Comments



Return again, return again return to the land of your soul; Return to <u>who</u> you are, return to <u>what</u> you are, return to <u>where</u> you are

Born and reborn again...

This simple but beautiful *niggun* or song which Reb Shlomo Carlebach paraphrased from ancient texts is at the core of our High Holy Day theme

of *Tshuvah* - repentance, reflection, return and renewal. Taken from Psalm 27 which we recite every day during the month of Elul [before Rosh Hashanah begins the 1st of Tishrei] we began introducing this haunting melody at Shabbat services. I know you will easily have it mastered during Rosh Hashanah if not before!

What does it mean to 'return' and how do we do it? It is not easy – it takes spiritual, physical and mental preparation and commitment. The Jewish New Year offers us a different kind of format for 'resolutions' without partying or fireworks. If you are not doing so already, perhaps you can start a new exercise, meditation or contemplative regimen. Perhaps you are already part of a stimulating discussion group, such as a book club or Torah study! If not, make a point of finding daily inspirational texts to read. Music – especially the music of the High Holy Days – gives us moments to search the innermost depths of our souls as well as reach for the highest heights.

And what about the big Yom Kippur fast? Fasting is as spiritual as it is physical; however it is very important to remember that if you are taking medications or have any medical restrictions against fasting, your health is the priority. In just about every religious faith throughout the world, there are illusions to fasting – but it is not [especially in the practice of yoga] a form of denial, discipline or punishment as it is the opportunity to rise above our physical state in a sort of meditative trance – transcendence – in order to gain inspiration and spiritual insight.

On Yom Kippur morning, in our Torah services, we read in the Haftarah from Isaiah: 'Is this the fast I desire? A day for men to starve their bodies? Is it bowing the head like a bulrush and lying in sackcloth and ashes? Do you call that a fast, a day when the Lord is favorable? No, this is the fast I desire: To unlock fetters of wickedness ...to let the oppressed go free...to share your bread with the hungry....then shall your light burst through like the dawn and your healing shall spring up quickly...

My family joins me in wishing each one of you a *Shanah Tovah u'm'tukah* – A Good and Sweet New Year full of blessings and a meaningful, reflective and contemplative Yom Kippur. May God hear our pleas and our prayers!

Treasurer's Report



As I begin my second year as your treasurer, it's my pleasure to begin a monthly column dedicated to the health and prosperity of our temple's finances. Many people have suggested that I make more of an effort to reach out to congregants. I'm not only happy to do so, it's my

responsibility! As an officer of a non-profit, I'm required to provide a full report of our finances to any member who requests it.

Before I get into the nuts and bolts of it all, I'd like to thank everyone who has already paid the year's dues in advance, especially those who have paid the sustaining amount of \$2,500 or more. This makes my job much, much easier and I am so grateful to the many families who contribute their fair share and more.

Although you'll be receiving this report in September, I'm writing it in August meaning that I can only report on July's finances. July may seem like a long time ago but as I write this it's the last month for which I have a full report. It's also usually the worst month in our financial year. Most people do not pay dues in July, since our fiscal year ends in June and dues letters don't go out until August. We're required to make several payments in July for taxes and insurance, and it's usually one of the hotter months meaning our electric bill is sky high. However, we expect this and with careful budgeting we always make it through.

In July, I'm pleased to say that we ran a deficit of "only" \$11,843 thanks to the efforts of our fundraising committee and because of income from outside events. We were able to cover this deficit with money from our general fund and without dipping into the line of credit we have for such occasions. I forecast our income in August will far exceed our expenses and we will be able to keep our checking accounts healthy so that we'll be ready the next time we run a deficit. We are still making capital payments from mortgage campaign contributions and expect to continue doing so until October. At that time we will need to make sure that we have enough contributions to the Mortgage Retirement Fund to cover our ongoing obligation.

My friends, I plan on continuing to report on our finances every month and it would be my pleasure to go over our summary reports or balance sheet in detail with any congregant who requests it. This year we will have many really big decisions to make. I thank you all for your trust, for your patience, and most of all for your willingness to do your part.

Mental Health Awareness In Action



Our long lazy summer days come to an abrupt end as we prepare and then enjoy the most holy days of our year. We search our minds and hearts for what we have done that would have been

better undone, and what good we might have done but didn't. Those of us working to diminish stigma about mental illness and to bring comfort to those who live with mental disorders examine ourselves as well. We are sure that by the end of Yom Kippur our energies will be revived and our minds focused on continuing our work and bringing more of our Emanu El community into this work.

Over the summer we brought together some of our young people to learn what mental illness actually is and how we can help. We talked with parents as well. We went to the movies, watching "Inside Out," and chatted over pizza about our understanding of that delightful animated film.

Last month the Homeless Liaison Officer with the Redlands Police Department joined us at the temple to help us understand the plight of the homeless right in our town. Officer Jennifer Ramstad inspired us to do more to help and do it wisely.

Might you help? There is much to do. You might join in with others in creating a Welcome Home Team for the homeless who get off the streets into new apartments. You might want to get Mental Health First Aid training as Nancy did in June. The County of San Bernardino will welcome you into their free classes. Might you like to volunteer at the Redlands Clubhouse, "Our Place," where adults diagnosed with mental illness can go and learn life skills and enjoy the accepting company of others? How about supporting our intrepid walker Larry Mink as he joins with the National Alliance on Mental Illness in their fundraiser early in November? And what about wearing a lime green ribbon from Each Mind Matters, California's effort on mental health? Heidi is our local supplier. When you wear the ribbon, people ask you about it and you get to talk about mental illness and help dispel stigma. You might even help buy the ribbons.

This year is going to be full of exciting events, Tikkun Olam projects, and building relationships with your peers. I can't wait to see you all soon!



New Names To Be Inscribed on Wall of Perpetual Memorial Extended Reservation Time

Our Wall of Perpetual Memorial is a most sacred place in our temple. It was part of the main hallway of our temple building in San Bernardino and is now part of a beautiful Memorial Alcove in our new temple edifice.

Names are added to our Wall of Perpetual twice each year. The next dedication will take place as part of an Erev Shabbat service on October 16, 2015 When a name is inscribed on the Wall of Perpetual Memorial it is read from the *bema* each year on the Shabbat closest to the *Yahrzeit* (the anniversary of death) and is included in the annual Book of Memory which is used at the four Yizkor/Memorial Services held during the year (Yom Kippur, Sh'mini Atzeret, the Conclusion of Pesach and Shavuot). Additionally, family members are notified annually of the impending *Yahrzeit* and provided with guidance on how they can appropriately mark the *Yahrzeit* of their loved one.

The Wall itself is made of exquisite marble and names are inscribed in gold leaf lettering.

The contribution for the inscription of a name on the Wall of Perpetual Memorial is \$650. for members of the congregation desiring to place the name of a loved one on the Wall. The contribution for non-members is \$1250.00. It is also possible to make pre-need arrangements for the placement of a name on the Wall after ones demise.

If you wish to have the name of a loved one inscribed on our Wall of Perpetual Memorial in time for our next dedication, please contact Judy Filsinger, Temple Administrator, no later than September 30th 2015.
