Rabbinic Reflections

Affirming Tradition - Embracing Modern Wisdom

Dear Friends,

The prayer book tells the story of the Jewish people from yesterday to today. We draw strength by reciting prayers like the Shema which we have said for thousands of years. At the same time each generation has added to and adapted the prayer book to speak to its time.

Kol Nidre is one of the most powerful prayers of the High Holy days. It is believed that it was added to the service during the Middle Ages. This was a time when the Jewish people often faced persecution and some were forced to convert to Christianity. Jewish tradition takes vows seriously and Kol Nidre absolved people of promises made under duress.

The great innovation of Reform Judaism in the United States was the introduction of the <u>Union Prayer Book</u> in 1892. Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise and the early Reform rabbis believed that the Jewish community needed a prayer book in English which maintained Jewish tradition and spoke to their experience.

In our own day, Miriam's Song has been added to the prayerbook. The words have become an anthem of inclusion:

And the women dancing with their timbrels
Followed Miriam as she sang her song
Sing a song to the One whom we've exalted
Miriam and the women danced and danced the whole night long

In this spirit the Reform movement has introduced a new prayer book (*machzor*) for the High Holydays called *Mishkan HaNefesh* (*Sanctuary for the Soul*) to speak to the hearts of the Jewish community. The introduction to the book says:

From feelings of awe to moments of solace, from the solitude of contemplation to the solidarity of song and worship, *Mishkan HaNefesh* inspires a multifaceted experience through the High Holy Days while embracing both the rich liturgical voices of the Jewish past and the aspirations of our people today.

I used the prayer book last year at Temple Israel in Omaha, Nebraska and it was joyously embraced by the congregation. It had new translations for prayers which are inclusive of women and men, transliteration for those who do not read Hebrew, and poems and meditations which combine the eternal wisdom of Judaism with the spirit of today.

(At Temple Israel the Senior Rabbi had retired and the Associate Rabbi moved to a different congregation. I led the congregation with a new assistant rabbi. The congregation found the new prayer book a source of comfort and inspiration during their transition.) I will be offering a workshop entitled *Affirming Tradition – Embracing Modern Wisdom* to provide an introduction to the Mishkan Hanfesh. I hope you will join me for one of these sessions.

Cantorial Comments



April, which this year encompasses the Hebrew months of *Nissan* and *Iyar* epitomizes, to me, one of the most emotionally and spiritually charged Jewish months of the year. While the latter observances this month were not commanded in the Torah, both this and the High Holy

Day seasons require individual and communal preparation and reflection. These two seasons exemplify our lives at their most joyful as well as our most solemn and sorrowful.

At Rosh Hashanah, in the seventh month of *Tishrei*, we rejoice together with important rituals in celebrating a spiritual New Year. With *Nissan*, the head of the Hebrew calendar year we celebrate the Pesach Festival and New Year of spring, rebirth and redemption. After Rosh Hashanah and the Ten Days of Repentence [Aseret Yamei Tshuvah] we spend a day, fasting if we are able, in solemn reflection, followed by a Yizkor, one of our most important memorial services of the year – but did you know that it is only one of four?! Passover also concludes with Yizkor – a formal service of psalms and recitation of the names of our loved ones who have passed. [The two other Yizkor services come after Shavuot and Sukkot]

On the 27th of Nissan, with Jews all around the world, *Yom Hashoah* is observed – a Day of Mourning and Remembrance for the millions of men, women and children who perished in the Holocaust. It is has become a platform for too many massacres since then, even more reason to honor this day and remember – *ZACHOR*. In the month of Iyar, *Yom Ha'atzma'ut*, [Israeli Independence Day] is celebrated – 70 years to date! In Israel, the day before Independence Day is always one of mourning and solemnity – Yom *HaZikaron* - a time of remembering all the soldiers who died defending Israel. At a certain point during the day, the entire country stops – wherever they are – in their cars, at work, at school – to observe a moment of silence.

APRIL 6: At Emanu El - to commemorate the end of Passover we look forward to a time-honored congregational tradition – that of the re-consecration of wedding vows. Every year, we celebrate the quinquennial [!] wedding vows of our members – whether their 5th or 75th anniversary – the opportunity to share these sacred vows with our congregational family is one of the sweetest times of the year. Marriage at its best truly reflects the celebratory highs and deepest lows we may experience in our lifetimes. And in Judaism, our tradition of the breaking of the glass reminds us of the fragile balance and preciousness of our lives.

Sisterhood will hold its yearly Women's Seder on April 4. Our Marriage Reconsecration service will take place during erev Shabbat on April 6. On April 20 a special Shabbat

service will dedicate a number of new leaves on our Simcha Tree, and unveil newly etched names of those recently departed to the tablets in our Memorial Room.

Then on Saturday April 21, we bestow the Rabbi Norman F. Feldheym Award to two most deserving members of our Temple community. Susan and Paul Shimoff exemplify all the qualities which define the this award which is named after the late Rabbi Norman F. Feldheym. This is our congregation's highest honor which recognizes exemplary contributions to our congregation, and the larger community. I hope you will join me as we confer upon Susan and Paul this most deserving honor.

Excitement continues to build as the time draws nearer to Rabbi Lindy Reznick becoming our new Rabbi. A Rabbinic Transition Task Force has been established which will be co-chaired by Dr. Bradley Hyman and Justin Swant. From helping Rabbi Reznick find housing, to helping her become well acquainted with our Temple community, the work of this Task Force will be essential in creating a smooth transition from Rabbi Crystal to Rabbi Reznick, as she her two children move from Los Angeles to the Inland Empire.

Our treasurer Marv Reiter should be commended for his diligent work in restructuring our mortgage loan where we now enjoy a substantially lower interest rate over an extended period of time. Please see the Treasurer's Report in this Bulletin for more detailed information.

The Machzor Prayer Book Task Force is hard at work looking at possibly moving from our current High Holy Day prayer book to the Mishkan Hanefesh, which is receiving wide acclaim for its transliterated liturgy and rich commentary drawing from Jewish tradition. Past President Julie Strain and member Ellen Weiss are heading up this temple initiative and are working closely with Rabbi Reznick and Cantor Bern-Vogel to determine if this Machzor might be a good fit for our congregation. In addition, Rabbi Crystal is providing input and will lead a series of workshops designed to introduce our membership to Mishkan Hanefesh which will also be discussed at length during our annual congregational meeting on May 17.

I wish each of you a Passover season filled with love of family and good friends. Chag Pesach Sameach!

Treasurer's Report



Dear Fellow Congregants,

I am pleased to report to you, that we have been able to improve our Mortgage Loan on our beautiful synagogue in Redlands. Through the invaluable assistance of long time San Bernardino bank executive Peggy Merryman and AltaPacific Bank, we have been

able to refinance our mortgage with most favorable terms. Our previous mortgage provided for interest only payments from the inception, November 1, 2016 to October 31, 2018. The rate at that time was reduced from 4.75% to 4.25%. At that time the amount of the loan was reduced from approximately \$2.3 million to \$1.5 million by applying investments that were yielding less than we were paying out in interest. The loan provided that on November 1, 2018, the loan would begin amortizing as well for the next 5 years based on a 25-year payback schedule. This loan was with Security Bank of California which was then acquired by Pacific Premier Bank. The banker who arranged this for us was Peggy Merryman.

Approximately one year ago, Ms. Merryman and three of her staff joined a bank new to our area, AltaPacific Bank on Vanderbilt Way in the Hospitality Lane area. She approached us to consider moving our banking relationship to this bank. After considerable negotiation, we were able to not only reduce the interest rate to 3.95%, but extend the interest only period for two additional years. The benefit of this was to immediately reduce our interest cost by \$350.00 per month or \$4,200.00 per year. Further, we improved our projected cash flow for the two years 11/1/18 to 10/31/20 by almost \$3,000 per month! For the period 11/1/20 to 10/31/25 our projected cash flow was reduced by \$233.00 per month for the five year period.

Your Board of Directors continues to improve our long term viability. Please be generous and do your fair share to ensure our continued operations.

Sisterhood Speaks



I ask everyone in the congregation (and non-congregation friends, too) to become a member of Sisterhood of Congregation Emanu El. When she is asked to join, occasionally a person has challenged me with the question of the relevance of our organization. I have also asked myself that, especially now in the era of #MeToo

and #TimesUp. Are we past the time when women needed a separate venue to demonstrate leadership? By supporting an organization called Sisterhood are we saying that we are segregating ourselves, standing for a traditional woman's role, rejecting the part that men play in synagogue life? I sincerely doubt that. Remember many of us belong to other groups that separate themselves out — environmental, health, alumni advocates; medical, teachers', lawyers' and other professional organizations. I view Sisterhood as another one of these associations.

For me, participation in Sisterhood is an expression of my identification not just with other Jewish women, but support of the values and history of the entire Jewish people in the way a woman might support the activities of her family. We arrange for learning, cultural, and entertainment activities. We work to provide financial support, and we work to provide a pleasant and nourishing environment. Do we exclude men in these activities? We welcome their participation! We offer an associate membership to men and have voted two male life members. We often have men attending our events, and they seem to enjoy it. I would like to hear suggestions as to more ways to integrate the congregational membership, both male and female into our meetings.

We are not just another Jewish organization, either. Of course, we strive to deliver support to our Redlands/San Bernardino Congregation Emanu El, but a part of our dues is transferred to the Pacific District of the Women of Reform Judaism, the National Women of Reform Judaism, and the Youth, Education and Special Projects Fund of the WRJ. Women of Reform Judaism has funded rabbinic scholarships since its founding in 1913, but the YES Fund was created in 1955 and has raised millions of dollars to build the dormitory at HUC-JIR in Cincinnati, the URJ Headquarters in New York, established the Jewish Braille Institute, founded the North American Federation of Temple Youth and helped to create the first URJ camp. The WRJ funds social justice campaigns, such as the Equal Pay Initiative.

Sisterhood membership is not about the past, although we think of it fondly. It is about the Reform Judaism of the present and the future. Isn't that why we all are here?

I am honored to have been nominated for a second year as Sisterhood President, and the proposed board of directors for 2018-2019 is a group of women I am thrilled to have the chance to work with. They are: Karyn Lehman, First Vice President; Cherrie Lubey, Treasurer; Kimberly Wolfe-Morgan, Recording Secretary; Michele Zipperstein, Corresponding Secretary; Susan Damron, Vice President Programs; Barbara Smith and Paula Kaye, Vice Presidents Membership; Karyn Lehman and Jill Weissman Vice

Presidents Ways and Means; Lisa Wise-Wolk, Gift Shop Manager; Margaret Shattuck, Gift Shop Treasurer; Debra Holder and Susanne Pastuschek, Vice Presidents Religion, Education. Youth; Lori Fenster, Vice President Administrative Services: Francesca Sweet. Parliamentarian. Our membership will vote to confirm our election at our final brunch on Sunday, June 3. Put that date on your calendar because our guest that morning, Rabbi Lindy Reznick, will engage us in a discussion and interchange — "Stories and Sharing Among Generations of Women". Mark that date, plan to join us, and invite your mother, daughter, close friend.



Holocaust Survivors – Affirming Their Testimonies

Modern Mapping Tools as a Guide to Learn Their Stories

The victims of the Holocaust were subjected to relocations of entire communities to ghettos, to seemingly endless lengths of time packed in cattle cars, to disorientation and starvation in concentration camps, to forced labor, and, for many, untimely death. Simultaneously, the Nazi genocide took place over more than a decade, reinventing national borders and remapping the entire European landscape. Dr. Sharon Oster and two of her students will talk about how GIS mapping tools create "Storymaps" to memorialize survivor experiences in terms of spatial scale and explore the ethical dimensions of the Holocaust.



Guest Speaker: Dr. Sharon Oster

Sharon B. Oster is Professor of English at the University of Redlands, where she teaches courses in late-nineteenth century American literature, American Jewish literature, and Holocaust studies. Her book, No Place in Time: The Hebraic Myth in Late Nineteenth-Century American Literature, is forthcoming November, 2018. As a three-time Fellow at the USHMM Center for Advanced Holocaust Studies, she is working on a second book project called "Impossible Holocaust Metaphors in Literature and Visual Culture: The Muselmann."
