Rabbinic Reflections

The Seder: Meaning within Meaning



Every generation is obligated to see themselves as if they were brought out of Egypt. Talmud

The Passover Seder is the most celebrated holiday in Jewish homes. Each family brings the holiday to life with special traditions. For some it is creating a Haggaddah which speaks to their life experience, for others it is a cherished ritual for finding the Afikoman, and for still others it is doing the Seder the same way that a beloved relative led the service in the past. As the Talmud suggests, Passover takes on its meaning when we go beyond rote observance of rituals to make the story of the Exodus our story today. In this spirit, let me share with you several of my favorite passages from the Haggaddah and the way I have experienced them coming to life.

“This is the bread of affliction that our ancestors ate in the land of Egypt. Let all who are hungry come and eat.”

In 2015, I had the honor of leading the Passover Seder at Lackland Air Force Base. This is the base where new airmen and airwomen go through basic training. For six weeks prior to the Seder, I taught a weekly class to the trainees. Members of the Temple Beth-El helped prepare and serve the meal. It was important that the trainees have this connection with our heritage – the symbols and the foods of the holiday. I was inspired to lead a service for these women and men who are dedicated to freedom through service to our country.

Another memory - every year when I lived in New York, we had a marvelous potluck Seder on the second night of Passover with 100 to 150 people. (I always appreciated the many variations on chicken and kugel). One year the Seder was different, guests were invited from a local assisted living facilities. I had the honor to sit with Sarah and Alvin. Sarah was blind and Alvin was confined to a wheel chair. They had been married for over 50 years and they were the only Jewish residents where they lived. There is a wonderful tradition of welcoming guests and hospitality for the Seder. Talking to Sarah and Alvin and seeing their gratitude for being included in the Seder, I developed a new appreciation for this Mitzvah.

“It happened that Rabbi Eliezer, Rabbi Yehoshua, Rabbi Elazar ben Azariah, Rabbi Akivah and Rabbi Tarfon were reclining (at a Seder) in Bnei Berak. They were discussing the Exodus all that night, until their students came and told them, “Masters! It is time for the morning prayer, the Shema.”

I had heard about it, but I had not experienced it until last year, *an all-night Seder!* This was not just a Seder that ran late, but the invitation was extended to come for the night and to be part of a minyan for services early in the morning when the sun came up. I had read the passage about the sages studying all night and always viewed it as through the prism of Jewish history; the rabbis were discussing whether or not to revolt against Rome in the 2nd century.

I found a deep meaning through this all-night Seder. Two months earlier I had gone with a group to Poland to affirm the story of 1,000 years of Jewish life and to remember those who died in the Shoah. To share the story of our liberation from Egypt, think of the destruction of the Holocaust and then see the sun rise in Jerusalem was awe inspiring. I felt the blessing of our liberation and cherished anew the gift of life.

The Passover Seder is completed as our heritage instructs us. Its symbols are done by our hands so may we do it next year! God who dwells on high soon may you lead your people to Zion. Next year in Jerusalem!

Our people have recited the words, “Next year, in Jerusalem,” for 2,000 years.” The words speak of the liberation of our people and our return to Israel. They also remind us of the liberty we experience in our lives.

I had a profound experience of liberty the year I worked as a hospital chaplain; liberty from the trauma of disease. All during the winter, I had worked with a young woman who was in intensive care. She had Guillain-Barré syndrome and her muscles became so weak that she could not breathe on her own and needed to be on a respirator. The only way she could communicate was by raising her eyes for “yes” and lowering them for “no.”

It was on the first night of Passover that year she was able to breathe on her own and leave the ICU. The joy that she and her family felt as she began to regain her strength and return to health was incredible. I shared Seder in the hospital with this woman’s family and many other patients. It was a time of liberation and a moment to give thanks for the blessing of life.

My friends, our heritage inspires us today as we take the stories and rituals of our people and weave them with our own life experiences. They become sacred touchstones for us to affirm life and draw inspiration. I hope your Seders are rich and meaningful and that you can take the time to add new stories of joy to the Haggaddah of your life. May you have a sweet and blessed Pesach!

From the start, Rabbi Reznick was the stand-out Rabbinic candidate and enjoyed the unanimous support from our Rabbinic Search Task Force; while receiving an overwhelming congregational approval vote of 49-1. Rabbi Reznick will be Congregation Emanu El's fifth settled Rabbi in the past eighty years and its first female Senior Rabbi.

Over the past two months, Rabbi Reznick and myself have become well acquainted as we worked to solidify an agreement beneficial to both Rabbi Reznick and Congregation Emanu El. Rabbi wanted me to convey to all of you that she is beyond excited at this opportunity to be Congregation Emanu El's new Rabbi and is very much looking forward to celebrating her new position with all of you.

Rabbi Reznick comes to Congregation Emanu El with nearly a decade of experience as a Rabbinic Educator with Wilshire Boulevard Temple in Los Angeles and as a School Rabbi with Milken Community Schools. Rabbi Reznick received her Rabbinic Ordination from Hebrew Union College in 2010 and holds a Master of Arts degree in Public Art Studies from the University of Southern California. She has traveled extensively throughout Israel with NFTY and is the proud mom of Clara (11) and Isaiah (8). She is fluent in both Hebrew and Spanish, and in her spare time, enjoys Yoga, hiking and meditating.

In the coming weeks and months, Rabbi Reznick and her family will begin making plans to move from Los Angeles to the Inland Empire where they will begin this new chapter in their lives. A transition team will be established which will help make the move and transition as easy as possible. There will be opportunities for you to get to know Rabbi and her children better before she officially begins work on July 1st, 2018.

These are exciting times for our congregation; I am honored to serve as your President during this historic transition. I hope you will join me in welcoming Rabbi Reznick, Clara and Isaiah, as they become the newest members of our Temple family.

As I seem to do, sometimes successfully, I encourage you all to satisfy your commitments to Congregation Emanu El, as we are a Congregation and are all responsible for the financial viability of our Synagogue.

We are anxiously awaiting the start of our Settled Rabbi, Lindy Resnick who will begin her duties on July 1, 2018. I hope you all have an opportunity to meet and greet our Rabbi at every opportunity. Hopefully, she will be visiting us prior to that date.

We are beginning the annual budgeting process for our 2018-2019 Fiscal Year operations. Sisterhood Speaks



As an adult, I have always looked forward to Passover. The foods are rich and comforting, the story is dramatic and has a triumphant ending. Another plus is the fact that it is an opportunity to spend an evening with people you enjoy and love. When I was a child, attending religious school at Peninsula Temple Beth El in San

Mateo, my parents did not hold a Seder at home (and if there was a community Seder at temple, we did not go). My father would buy a box of matzah in the grocery store as soon as Passover foods appeared, open it the next morning to eat with his scrambled eggs, and when that box was empty, that was the end of Passover foods. We did not have relatives close by to have a Seder with, and so I guess the default was to have none. Years later, my mother told me that the Seders of her childhood were boring evenings, with her strict grandfather conducting the entire service in Hebrew, and the children fidgeting in their seats. However, my sisters and I did have a model Seder in religious school, and we eventually came home and announced, "We are supposed to have our own Seder at home, you know." My parents got the hint, proposed to some friends that we combine efforts and families, and the Kaplan and Harris families celebrated a Reform Pesach together to everyone's satisfaction. And so, it is my pleasure to help plan the second night Seder for Congregation Emanu El in the hope that everyone will have an opportunity to celebrate this meaningful holiday. Look elsewhere in this bulletin for further information.

Before the arrival of Pesach, we have a mini-program on Sunday, March 11. We'll have light refreshments, a screening of the film, *The Women's Balcony*, and discussion. There is no charge for our mini-programs, and I hope that you will join us for a pleasant and thought-provoking morning.

Looking farther into the future, Sisterhood is again planning to hold its biennial Women's Seder on Wednesday, April 4 in the social hall at 6 p.m. Cantor Jen Bern Vogel will guide us in a pleasant and informal observance. While we plan to follow the basic Seder format, we will focus on sharing ideas and discuss our personal responses to the meaning of Passover. As part of our reflection on the meaning of Pesach, please bring an item, symbolic or precious, you would take if you were fleeing your home. You are invited to join us and bring a friend if you wish. Please register by calling the office or using Eventbrite. The main dish, matzah, symbols, wine and grape juice will be provided; but you are invited to bring a Pesach dish to share. If you would like to add a creative touch, we could provide you with a recipe. We'd love to see a variety of Ashkenazic and Sephardic dishes. The cost will be \$18 for anyone not bringing a dish to share, and children under 13 will pay their age.

And our final mini-program of the year will take place on April 15, when we go on a morning nature walk in Redlands. This will be the second annual Spring Redlands Wild Trails Walk, and last year's participants reported a

truly enjoyable stroll. We'd love to have you come along, so put it on your calendar.

And while you are saving dates for us, Sisterhood is planning another lovely brunch for members and guests. The date will be Sunday, June 3 and the place will be the social hall from 10 am until noon. We hope to have a special program for everyone, so don't forget to put this one on your Google calendar!

Everyone is invited to participate in all our events and also to attend our board meetings. The next Sisterhood Board Meeting will be March 4 at 10 am in the social hall. 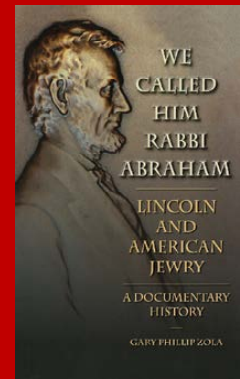

DR. GARY P. ZOLA
WILL SPEAK ON
"HE WAS ONE OF US:
THE JUDAIZATION OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN"



Dr. Gary P. Zola is the Executive Director of The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the American Jewish Archives and Edward M. Ackerman Family Distinguished Professor of the American Jewish Experience at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati. Professor Zola edits The Marcus Center's award-winning biannual publication, The American Jewish Archives Journal - one of only two academic periodicals focusing on the total historical experience of American Jewry.

In 2011 Dr. Zola was appointed by President Obama to the Commission for the Preservation of American Heritage Abroad. In 2006 he became the first



American Jewish historian and the first American rabbi to receive appointment to the Academic Advisory Council of the congressionally recognized Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission.

Dr. Zola was ordained as a rabbi at HUC-JIR in 1982 and received his Ph.D in American Jewish history in 1991.

THE RABBI HILLEL COHN ENDOWED LECTURE
ON THE CONTEMPORARY JEWISH EXPERIENCE

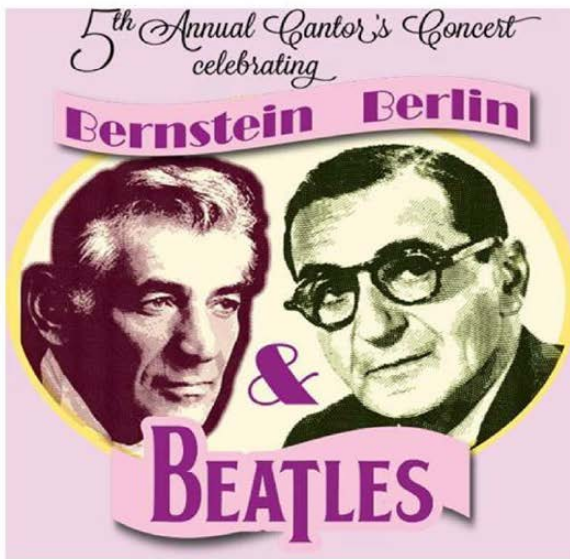


The Rabbi Hillel Cohn Endowed Lecture on the Contemporary Jewish Experience was established at California State University, San Bernardino in recognition of Rabbi Cohn's many achievements as a religious and community leader. This is the first time in the history of the entire California State University system that a rabbi has been so honored. Each year the Endowed Lecture brings scholars of note to the Inland Empire and the Coachella Valley. Rabbi Cohn served as rabbi of Congregation Emanu El in San Bernardino 1963-2001, 2014-2015 and is now rabbi emeritus of that historic congregation, now located in Redlands. In 2010 Rabbi Cohn chaired the City of San Bernardino Bicentennial Commission. In 2017 he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters by CSUSB.
