Rabbinic Reflections



Wow, I cannot believe we are entering January 2020. It seems to have come quickly and without warning. I am grateful for this season and to have arrived in this secular new year. I want to share with you about one of my favorite books, *Help, Thanks, Wow*, by Anne Lamott. In this book, Lamott reminds us of three central kinds of prayers. She writes that there is something to be said about keeping prayer simple: help, thanks, wow. Lamott defines prayer as "communication from the heart to that which surpasses understanding. Prayer is talking to something or anything with which we seek union". She goes on to write, "if you are telling the truth, you are close to God." In this new year, I encourage each of you to take some time to pray your prayers of help, thanks, and wow, to the eternal source of everything.

Help is often an easy place to start prayer. It comes regularly from a place of exasperation and desperation. We reach out because we realize that we are not able to solve whatever issue we are desperately trying to fix. Then we turn to someone, something greater than ourselves and say help, please. I encourage you to ask for help from God with anything you're struggling to figure out, fix, heal or get support from. God help me to support my partner, be present for my children, and help me to follow your lead.

Thanks, writes Lamott, "is the short form of the original prayer I used to say in gratitude for any unexpected grace in my life, thank you thank you." There is so much to be grateful for, whether it is not being caught speeding, not giving in to that unhealthy habit, or receiving an angelic puppy to share forever love with me. There are always things to stop and thank God for. I thank God for the flowers that appeared on my desk, for the sweet channukah cards which came in the mail, for the friend who reminds me why I live here. Gratitude helps us to appreciate what is, and see the beauty and miracles all around us.

"The third great prayer, *Wow*, is often offered with a gasp, a sharp intake of breath, when we can't think of another way to capture the sight of shocking beauty or destruction, of a sudden unbidden insight or an unexpected flash of grace. *Wow*, means we are not dulled to wonder."

Our lives are filled with *wow* moments, waiting to be appreciated. When the sun sets over the San Bernardino mountain tops and pinkish orange descends on the brown hills, I say *wow*! What are your *wow* moments today?

This secular new year, I want to encourage you to take some time for prayers of help, thanks and wow. See how that can transform your spiritual life in 2020.

Songs of reflection, love, longing, hope, and social commentaries grapple with where society has come from and perhaps, help us slow down a bit, to consider where we may be going...

"Those were the days, my friends..." Yes, we are moving forward, but as Kohelet [Ecclesiastes] wrote in chapter one: Lakol z'man v'eit l'chol chefetz tachat hashamayim ... there is a time and place for everything under heaven.... Save that date and treat yourself to taking time to look back with us and delight in some of the wonderful popular songs that have brought us to today.

Mental Health Awareness in Action

We have had yet another UN climate conference. Yet another season full of unusually dangerous fires. Around the world, Australia was burning out of season and in usually wet places. Sea levels are causing havoc in Venice, Italy, in Louisiana, in Virginia, and especially in the South Pacific. Etc.

And therapists are finding more of their patients are expressing fear of climate change. These climate emotions are called 'climate anxiety,' 'climate depression,' 'climate rage,' 'climate grief.' They can be paralyzing, but they don't have to be. People who look after our mental health have suggestions:

- First and foremost, talk with others who share your worries acknowledge your deepest feelings
- Be activist find where you can be useful in making a difference
- Make small changes in your personal life to produce less carbon
- Spend time outside among trees or meadows or by the sea or lakes

Remember anxiety is not necessarily pathological. Climate change is real and concern is reasonable. Transforming denial or anxiety into energizing action is also reasonable.

And a few more suggestions:

- Make time for singing and dancing and idly watching clouds in the sky
- Spend time in an art museum, a concert hall, and sitting under a big tree
- Paint, sculpt, write poetry, play or compose music, create a climate dance
- Get together regularly to worry and create together.
- Imagine a new world.

And mostly:

Plant a tree. Care for it. Plant another tree. Etc.
