Treasurer's Report

I hope that you are all doing well and that you enjoyed our High Holiday Services.. A big thank you to the clergy and staff for working so hard to bring us services we could participate in.

Attached is the 2019/2020 income and expense report for Congregation Emanu El. This report reflects the Operating Fund of our Temple. If you have any questions please contact me at kathy.rosenfeld@gmail.com or 704-756-7427.

Notes:

- A This represents dues that congregants pledged but did not pay for fiscal year 2019/2020.
- B This represents funds that congregants paid to the building fund during fiscal year 2019/2020. These monies can only be released by the Board of Directors to be used for building improvement, maintenance, or repairs.
- C Due to Covid-19, the building was unavailable for rent during February - March. Budgeted revenue from this line item was unavailable. In several instances CEE refunded deposits.
- D No fundraisers were held during fiscal year 2019/2020 due to a lack of volunteers to lead the fundraisers and due to Covid-19.
- E CEE was blessed to have had a large bequest in fiscal year 2019/2020. The funds were not used for operating purposes but rather to decrease the mortgage debt and to be used for future improvements to the facilities for child and adult education purposes.
- F MRF - Mortgage Reduction Fund - this represents contributions collected from congregants during fiscal year 2019/2020 to reduce the mortgage debt.
- G Represents improvements, repairs and maintenance on our building. Improvements included additional security measures not covered by donations and grants.
- H The insurance premiums remained the same as prior year and thus were less than budgeted.
- I Increase costs due to additional programming for religious school participants, new books, and curriculum changes for some classrooms.
- J Increase in costs due to hiring outside performers for our Shabbat services and community holiday events such as the Chanukah Dinner.

- K Due to Covid-19, Community Programs in the second portion of the fiscal year were cancelled.
- L Due to Covid-19, Senior Programs in the second portion of the fiscal year were cancelled.
- M Due to no fundraisers being held in fiscal year 2019/2020, there were no corresponding fundraising expenses.
- N This represents the interest on the mortgage debt. It is not an operating expense and is paid with mortgage relief contributions.
- O The net income for the Operating Fund was actually a **loss of \$322,709**. Our bills were covered for 2019/2020 due to the following:
 1. A \$48,000 Payroll Protection Payment grant from Banner Bank. We anticipate that this will be forgiven with only an interest expense to the congregation.
 2. The use of the \$125,000 Line of Credit. In March and April the line was fully extended to meet the congregation's expenses. As dues for the 2020/2021 fiscal year were collected the Line of Credit was reduced to zero.

Mental Health Awareness in Action California Office of Suicide Prevention?

Is it time to get serious about the increasing problem of suicide? Our Assemblyman James C. Ramos (40th Assembly District) thinks so. And he more than just thinks – he introduced a bill in the California legislature, AB 2112, in February to create an Office of Suicide Prevention. He envisions this office as focusing on the many causes that too often push young people, older people, veterans, LGBTQ and others who suffer from discrimination to take their own lives. He expects the marshalling of resources on a state-wide basis will get help to people who feel alone and are despairing. The bill in Sacramento has gotten through all the relevant committees and passed both houses without one vote against it. We all see the need to address suicide openly and actively.

“I introduced AB 2112 because of the tragic toll suicide takes on families and communities,” Assemblyman Ramos said. “In 2017 more than 4,300 Californians died by suicide, and another 18,523 Californians received service in an emergency department for intentional self-harm. Children, seniors, LGBTQ, and veterans are among the most vulnerable.” Also Native Americans and Native Alaskans between the ages of 10 and 34, and for them suicide is the second leading cause of death.

And we know because of this pandemic, depression and anxiety have greatly increased. Mental health professionals are deeply worried. As of press time, we are waiting only for the pen of Governor Gavin Newsom to make the Office of Suicide Prevention real.

The holiday of Sukkot brings back many childhood memories. When I was a child in Israel, people started building the sukkah immediately after breaking the fast at the end of Yom Kippur. They built the Sukkot everywhere, in yards, balconies, and patios. My family never bought a sukkah that we just had to assemble, instead we built our own homemade sukkah. It was much more fun hanging old blankets as walls, palm tree branches as roof and decorating it with pictures and ornaments that we made or bought for it. Some years the Sukkah stood firm all the 8 days, in others we had to celebrate the holiday indoors because the fall winds began to blow away the roof and the first rain of the year soaked the blankets and unfortunately ruined our ornaments. In those good times when we still had a lot of rain in the fall time.

The most important Sukkot time for me was when I was 14 and had my Bat Mitzvah at Congregation Har El in Jerusalem. It started when I looked at a picture of a female cousin, holding the Torah and wearing a Tallit at her Bat Mitzvah celebration. I immediately knew that I was going to do it as well, and I did!

On the first day of Sukkot, I chanted my Torah portion and felt proud and excited that I made it. I also remember my speech about the Sukkah as “SUKKAT SHALOM” and a symbol of peace, and on the tradition of Inviting guests to the sukkah. This is a beautiful tradition. The sukkah is a place to gather with family, friends, and also new guests we would like to get to know.

I wish all of us that very soon we will be able to sit in the Sukkah together again, as a place of peace and peace of mind. If you build your sukkah, I would love to see it and you can email a picture to sjl@emanuelsb.org.
