Cantorial Comments

"The Place Where we are Right", etc...



This month finds us on the precipice of our 2020 presidential election and the anniversary of Kristallnacht, November 9, 1938 – Kristallnacht, that is so very personal and yet affected the fate of millions. I know I am hardly alone in the fears and Angst of our present day pandemic and divisiveness in our land. For months, we have been consumed with uncertainty and while we will continue to live with whatever the results of the final vote, the Coronavirus is far from over. In addition to frustration and fear, anger is a common and natural feeling, but *Ma la'asot?!* what do we do with it?!

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel taught that "Anger is something that comes dangerously close to evil, yet it is wrong to identify it with evil...Like fire, it may be a blessing as well as a fatal thing – reprehensible when associated with malice, morally necessary as resistance to malice...Anger may touch off deadly explosives, while the complete absence of anger stultifies moral sensibility."

The English poet, David Whyte, has written that "anger is the deepest form of compassion, for another, for the world, for the self, for a life, for the body, for a family and for all our ideals, all vulnerable and all, possibly about to be hurt."

Allow me to share two pieces of uplifting and beautifully thought-provoking poetry; one by Israeli's most celebrated poet, Yehuda Amichai and the second by American Jewish activist poet, Marge Piercy.

<u>The Place Where We Are Right</u> by Yehuda Amichai

From the place where we are right Flowers will never grow In the spring.

The place where we are right Is hard and trampled Like a yard.

But doubts and loves Dig up the world Like a mole, a plow. And a whisper will be heard in the place Where the ruined House once stood. A Just Anger by Marge Piercy

Anger shines through me. Anger shines through me. I am a burning bush. My rage is a cloud of flame. My rage is a cloud of flame in which I walk seeking justice like a precipice. How the streets of the iron city flicker, flicker, and the dirty air fumes. Anger storms between me and things, transfiguring, transfiguring. A good anger acted upon is beautiful as lightning and swift with power. A good anger swallowed, a good anger swallowed clots the blood to slime.

May our emotions be tempered and the confluence of our voices join in harmonic discourse and song when we conclude this November month in gratitude and Thanksgiving ! Cantor Jennifer Bern-Vogel

- This represents dues that congregants pledged but did not pay for fiscal year 2019/2020. Α с Due to Covid-19, the building was unavailable for rent during February - March. Budgeted
- revenue from this line item was unavailable. In several instances CEE refunded deposits. D No fundraisers were held during fiscal year 2019/2020 due to a lack of volunteers to lead the fundraisers and due to Covid-19.
- Ε CEE was blessed to have had a large bequest in fiscal year 2019/2020. The funds were not used for operating purposes but rather to decrease the mortgage debt and to be used for future improvements to the the facilities for child and adult education purposes.
- MRF Mortgage Reduction Fund this represents contributions collected from congregants during fiscal year 2019/202 to reduce the mortgage debt.

- Due to Covid-19, Community Programs in the second portion of the fiscal year were cancelled. к

- Due to no fundraisers being held in fiscal year 2019/2020, there were no corresponding Μ fundraising expenses.
- This represents the interest on the mortgage debt. It is not an operating expense and is Ν paid with mortgage relief contributions.
- The net income for the Operating Fund was actually a loss of \$155,240. 0 Our bills were covered for 2019/2020 due to the following:
 - 1. A \$48,000 Payroll Protection Payment grant from Banner Bank. We anticipate that this will be forgiven with only an interest expense to the congregation
 - 2. The use of the \$125,000 Line of Credit. In March and April the line was fully extended to meet the congregation's expenses. As dues for the 2020/2021 fiscal year were collected the Line of Credit was reduced to zero.



Mental Health Awareness in Action

Not very long ago we experienced our Days of Awe. We don't know how many of us actually felt awe, but we're hoping there were many. Awe is good for us.

The September issue of the Mayo Clinic Health Letter devoted a few paragraphs to "The Power of Awe." Its benefits include lowering stress levels, reducing inflammation, improving heart rate and diastolic blood pressure. Good for body and mind, especially if indulged in regularly.

So how to we find it? Watching a sunset, listening to or making beautiful music, looking at art or creating it, reading and collecting inspiring quotes. And more – meditation, prayer, yoga and t'ai chi can evoke awe in us. Important life events like births, weddings, b'nei mitzvah all cause us to feel awe. And so do noticing hummingbirds sipping flowers, sunlight filtering through tree leaves, the moon rising. Another way to fill our lives with awe is to keep an awe journal, and read it when we're feeling anxious or distressed. And to collect gorgeous or amazing photos.

We use the word "awesome" a lot these days, but the actual experience of awe is to be cherished and cultivated. And there are many ways to allow awe into our daily lives. Awe is never boring, and we can never have too much.
