This year, as many of us have been hunkered down at home, the world needs the holidays more than ever. I don't remember seeing holiday decorations up this early last year, but I understand. Now we need something to look forward too, a little glitter, cheer, and twinkle lights.

I invite you to bring this cheer into your own homes this year. As the country is preparing to shut down again, Covid-19 cases are raging and hospitals are filling up, we focus on what we can control. We can wear masks to keep ourselves and others safe, science supports this.

We wash our hands 100 times a day, and lather up with moisturizing creams. Our homes become our gyms, our sanctuary is broadcast from our dining rooms, offices, and desks. We've been here before. Though it's hard to believe,
we are already in December
and in the Jewish month of
Kislev which means –
Hannuka is s close. Hanukah
is one of my favorite
holidays, with its variety of
Hanukiot and colorful
candles, the tasty Sufganiot
(Jelly doughnuts) and Latkes,

which will always remind me of my Baba (yes that's
how I called my grandma, probably a short for
babushka).

In Israel, while most of the Jewish holidays have
restrictions, for example: no Chametz in Passover,
no driving on Yom Kippur and closing stores early
on Fridays before Shabbat. Hanukkah is a holiday
without limitations, it is a festive week, *Hanukiot*
with candles are everywhere and the passersby are
invited to recite the blessings and light candles.

Every bakery displays trays of the *Sufganiot* that
from year to year become more sophisticated and it's
very hard to resist the smell of warm fresh
Sufganiot.

The story of Hannukah, in one short sentence, is
the triumph of the few and powerless over the
numerous and powerful. As a teacher in Israel, I
used to teach my young students the power of light
over darkness. And we always sang the song "*Banu
hoshech legaresh*" that talks about chasing away the
darkness with one small light and that one alone is a
small light but all together we are a big strong light.

That is also the importance of community, we
are always stronger together and we have learned it
during these harsh times of the pandemic. We feel
better and stronger when we are together even if it is
through zoom.

Mental Health Awareness in Action
The Me2 Orchestra is orchestrating change.

What kind of change? They're changing lives – the lives of their musicians, the lives of the families of their musicians, the lives of their audiences.

If you play an instrument, can play classical music, and have a diagnosed mental illness – or not – you are eligible, no audition necessary. But you do need to get to Burlington, Vermont or Boston, Massachusetts. Or Portland, Oregon, Manchester, New Hampshire, and soon the Music Director expects to create Me2 orchestras all over the country.

He is Ronald Braunstein. He was a brilliant, budding young conductor, a Jewish boy from Pittsburgh, when stigma against his bi-polar disorder tossed him out of his chosen life path. So, he started his own orchestra, “a stigma-free zone.” Along the way, he found a loving wife who is co-founder and manager of the orchestra, Caroline Whiddon. And together with their musicians they perform in many places, including prisons, and especially in youth detention centers, where they know many struggle with mental problems.

For many, this is the first place in their lives where they are fully accepted, understood, and respected. Sometimes the musicians have crises, even may be hospitalized, but they know they will be welcomed back when they're ready.

As a French horn player says: “I am not defined by my illness – I am so much more.” And now they belong, have “an identity, a sense of purpose” says a bass player. “I have bipolar disorder or I have schizophrenia – and I'm alive!” Alive and growing, becoming better musicians. As Caroline says, they are “changing people from a place of darkness to a place of strength and confidence.”

With every note, they expertly bring the message: “Don't shut us out!”

There's a wonderful documentary about Ron, Caroline and their musicians, “Orchestrating Change,” the film, shown recently on KVCR-TV.
