SHARED LEGACIES: The African-American Jewish Civil Rights Alliance

The crucial historical lessons of Black-Jewish cooperation are revisited and revived in this urgent call to action. The modern alliance between African-Americans and Jewish Americans dates to the NAACP founding in 1909. Since then, both groups have endured segregation and racism, from the codified bigotry of southern Jim Crow laws, to blatant bias in real estate, employment, higher education and politics. Common cause was found in the turbulent '60s Civil Rights era, as Jewish leaders backed Dr. King's efforts at racial equality and harmony. Yet, the relationship has frayed in recent years, as a once mighty bond of support and respect has seemingly faded, been forgotten or ignored. *Shared Legacies* contends with issues of systemic racism that engulf us in the current national crisis and pursues the aspiration of Dr. King to create a "coalition of conscience."

Also in January we are inviting Rabbi Lisa Edwards, Rabbi Emerita of Beth Chayim Chadashim on Friday January 22nd, 2021 to lead us in prayer. Additionally we will come together and celebrate Shabbat In a joint service with Temple Sinai of Palm Desert and their new Rabbi David Novak, on Friday February 5th. New beginnings mean many new prayer experiences with new friends and old. Please tell your friends and plan to join us online for an exciting beginning to 2021. Together we will pray in a new year filled with hope and promise for a better world.

around the world. The world has never seen such an incredible coordinated response to a health crisis. Indeed, it's never needed one like this before. We enter 2021 still in the throws of political uncertainty, economic uncertainty, and a worldwide pandemic. We may not have even seen the worst of it, but I firmly believe that we are finally on the right path. I hope you do too.

Celebrating 'This Precious Life' 2021 Excerpts from interpretations of the Psalms* [Alden Solovy]

From Pesach 2020 until now, we have celebrated, mourned, connected, grieved, consoled, laughed and cried

together via our new-found and ever-growing technologies on zoom. While the joy of actually singing simultaneously via zoom still begs for not-yet-achieved technological advances, we turn the corner of this secular year filled with both sorrow and hope, and let us least say, Hallelujah! 2020 truly is hindsight – forever!!

My old friend from college days in Beloit, Wisconsin, Alden Solovy, has become one of the most prolific liturgical poets of our time, giving new life to ancient texts that we read and sing. His newest collection, <u>This Precious Life</u>, was written during 2020 and now being published in 2021 in this time of the still-raging Covid pandemic; he reaches out from his Jerusalem office across the continents, knowing that everyone of us has been affected profoundly, in one way or another, either as essential workers on the frontline, grieving loved ones or friends, or simply by the isolation as a result of trying to protect ourselves and one another from contracting the potentially fatal virus.

Alden suggests that "..each of us is being asked – perhaps required – to consider what gives our lives meaning. What we value. Our connections. Our contributions. Our legacy. The past. The future. This very moment. This precious life. The place in which we encounter the Divine."

Psalms [of which we have 150!] are some of our most ancient texts and originally chanted, were written to serve the needs of the complex human condition. To console, for rejoicing and mourning; for study, healing, fertility and to ensure safe travels, to name just a few.

This month we will celebrate MLK Shabbat [Jan 15] together with Rabbi Suzanne Singer and Congregation Beth El of Riverside combining our music, liturgical and special readings.

and also Shabbat Shirah [Jan 22 and 23] when we read *B'shalach* ' The Song of the Sea

Mental Health Awareness in Action Spiritual resilience

Leaving the strangest year we've ever been through, we look ahead to 2021. And now it's especially smart to check in on our spiritual resilience. Our *what*? you may ask.

According to Nick Arnett, expert on crisis intervention, who led a workshop this summer for Redlands CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) members, the 3 important types of resiliency are physical, emotional/psychological, and spiritual.

When we are in spiritual distress, our response tends to get us caught up in selfish and survivalist thinking. We lose track of the longer term and we find time zipping by or slowing to a molasses crawl. (Sound familiar?) Neither pace is accurate or helpful. Our vision narrows into the proverbial tunnel and lets us ignore the consequences of our actions.

Nick says spiritual recovery helps us restore normal time and allows us to see the wider picture. He urges us to "pause and plan." A little meditation or prayer goes a long way. Or just stepping back for that wider, more careful look.

A Mayo Clinic health newsletter says:

"You can be spiritual by reflecting on your own life and its purpose, and connecting to something larger than yourself, whether through religious worship, art, music or the natural world."

What really matters to you? Pause and consider. Doing just that makes you stronger, more resilient.

So, if your joy and strength in life comes from music, when you're feeling too stressed – play music, sing. Or if it's art – paint, create something beautiful in your garden, in your sewing, in woodworking. Or insist on taking time to meditate, to pray. And go outside for a walk or just to sit under a tree and watch the birds. This is how you grow stronger, more resilient. This is what we all need in order to be present for our lives and to cope with all the stresses, especially this strange COVID-19 life.

OUR BUILDING

As of December 1, 2020, our building on Ford Street is 100% closed to the public. No one will be let in without an appointment. This step has been taken to make sure our community and our staff is protected.

Because of the severity of the pandemic, we will not allow socializing outside the building, even with social distancing and face masks. **This applies to everyone.**

If you need scrip or something else from the temple, call us at 909-307-0400 between 9am and 3pm Monday through Friday. We can arrange for contactless pickup or we can mail something to you.

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We will continue online-only services until it is safe to reopen. Even after state guidelines allow us to offer in-person services, our task force will take the advice of doctors within our community.

Until then, our Zoom services are open to all. <u>First-time visitors must use their</u> <u>real first and last name in Zoom and turn</u> <u>on their cameras.</u> This is done to keep a safe environment for all. If there are any problems at all, our Facebook feed is open to all. Go to <u>https://facebook.com/</u> <u>emanuelredlands</u> to watch services if you can't get into Zoom. No registration is needed.

It's true, a vaccine is right around the corner and it can't come soon enough. But, it will still take several months for everyone to get vaccinated. Until then, it's up to you:

Don't visit your friends at home. The government and the media both agree, in-home gatherings are the #1 way that COVID-19 spreads right now. Use Zoom, call people on the phone, or send an old-fashioned letter. <u>Staying away from each other is the best defense we have right now</u>.

Wear a mask whenever you are outside. The coronavirus can hang in the air much longer than you'd think. Get in the habit of putting on your mask before you walk out of the house and don't take it off until you are back home safely. If 100% of people did this, it would be just as effective as a vaccine.
