My friends, it was a year ago this month that we all made the difficult decision to stop in-person services at



Congregation Emanu El. Like most of us, I believed this would be a temporary blip, done and over with before anything had a chance to gather dust. As it sits today, we still do not have a plan to reopen. We've been told that we could open at 25% capacity with sufficient safeguards. We will open one day soon, but only when our own doctors tell us it's safe. We listen to science, not politics, at Congregation Emanu El.

As you know, I like to tie each column to a song, and this time it's "My Shot" from Hamilton. If you're not familiar, click anywhere on this article to hear it. Hamilton cleverly leverages the dual meanings of the term, painting Hamilton himself as ambitious and being unwilling to step away from opportunity while reminding us that his life ended in a duel where he may have intentionally missed.

In March 2021, though, "my shot" has a different meaning. I'm encouraged by hearing that so many of you have chosen to take a shot in the arm to help us all heal a little faster. As I write this, it seems to be working. I hope that it won't be much longer until we can all leave home safely and come together like we once did every week.

Please don't throw away "your shot." If you don't trust the science, talk to your doctor. They've probably gotten their shot. If you are worried about the side effects, take it in context. moment, doctors are your best source of information, and they are nearly unanimous in saying the risks of the vaccine are minimal, and that it works. And that's the best thing you'll read all day, I'd bet.

A year of COVID And it's Pesach time again....

Has it really been a year? What could we have foreseen? What lies ahead as we summon our voices, spirits and strength towards renewal as we virtually celebrate our beloved Pesach Spring

Festival for the 2nd round?! We have all waded through muddy waters of an unknown wilderness this year, supporting one another in the best ways we could and somehow, long for Life BC – Before Covid.

Passover is the time of stories – of sharing, asking questions, not always having answers, but always delving deeper in an effort to link the past to the present. In the spirit of Covid Passover II, I'd love to share a beautiful story I recently discovered...

When he was 40, the renowned Jewish Bohemian novelist and short story writer Franz Kafka (1883–1924), who never married and had no children, was strolling through Steglitz Park in Berlin, when he chanced upon a young girl crying her eyes out because she had lost her favorite doll. She and Kafka looked for the doll without success. Kafka told her to meet him there the next day and they would look again.

The next day, when they still had not found the doll, Kafka gave the girl a letter "written" by the doll that said, "Please do not cry. I have gone on a trip to see the world. I'm going to write to you about my adventures."

Thus began a story that continued to the end of Kafka's life. When they would meet, Kafka read aloud his carefully composed letters of adventures and conversations about the beloved doll, which the girl found enchanting. Finally, Kafka read her a letter of the story that brought the doll back to Berlin, and he then gave her a doll he had purchased. "This does not look at all like my doll," she said. Kafka handed her another letter that explained, "My trips, they have changed me." The girl hugged the new doll and took it home with her.

A year later, Kafka died.Many years later, the now grown-up girl found a letter tucked into an unnoticed crevice in the doll. The tiny letter, signed by Kafka, said, "Everything you love is very likely to be lost, but in the end, love will return in a different way."

May we all 'return' and be renewed, with the knowledge that what we have lost can give us new meaning and depth to our lives, and... that love never really dies.

Mental Health Awareness in Action

We're closing in on a decade of offering monthly Bulletin articles about our congregation's social action pursuit to end the dangerous shame and stigma in needing mental health treatment.

Our program, Mental Health Awareness In Action (MHAIA), is solidly grounded in the Jewish teaching that our bodies are holy vessels composed of intricate veins, arteries and organs including the brain. Judaism charges us to honor and care for bodies and our minds.

Americans don't easily talk about brain illness, but that is changing as more and more revered public figures and our most accomplished athletes tell their personal stories of managing mental illness. They help us understand that symptoms of mental unwellness are not weaknesses to be overcome privately on one's own. Help can best be had by speaking up about how we are doing. Talking is the very best place to start.

The effort to end the stigma of mental illness has never been more important as the prolonged isolation of the pandemic challenges each of us to stay mentally healthy. This month we will retell the story of our Exodus from slavery for the second consecutive year under pandemic restrictions. That is hard. Let's be kind and gentle with ourselves as we again feel the loss of face-to-face celebration.

No concern about mental well-being is small. Please reach out by talking to a trusted friend or congregant, a therapist or your doctor. We know the first step takes courage. You are valuable. You are worth it. Speak up!

WHERE WE STAND

As of March 1, 2021, San Bernardino County is still in the "purple" tier.

This means that we are still at a dangerous point and that the spread of COVID-19 is still not under control. It feels like things are better, but we are still not ready to re-open our building.

The California Supreme Court has ruled that houses of worship *may* open in limited capacity. Your Board of Directors understands that our older members are at extremely high risk and we have opted to keep all services online-only until we can all be safe.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: Why aren't we opening at the same time as other churches?

A: Our community has many older and immunocompromised members. We'll listen to doctors and we'll re-open when we can all be safe.

Q: Who decides when we re-open?

A: The decision is up to our Board of Directors, who listens to our Health and Safety Task Force. That group is made up of lay leaders, clergy, and doctors.

Q: When we open, will vaccination be required to get in the door?

A: We urge every member of the community to get the vaccine when they are allowed. However, we do not plan to require proof of vaccination to come to services.

Q: Can we do outdoor events in the meantime?

A: We are actively looking at ways to do safe outdoor events while still being fair to the homeowners in our neighborhood. Watch the weekly emails for more details!


