ANNE FRANK'S AMERICAN PEN PAL – From Iowa to Redlands

Five years ago, when friends from Iowa were in Los Angeles for our child's bar mitzvah, they paid a visit to the Museum of Tolerance [Simon Wiesenthal Center] to view the Anne Frank exhibit. To their

surprise, they learned that Anne Frank and her sister were briefly connected to two sisters in America who became their pen pals; the sisters were Juanita and Betty Wagner, from Danville, Iowa. So began a fascinating discovery of local history that was impacted by the tragic events the Nazi regime of World War Europe and that concluded in Los Angeles and Redlands.

Through the innovative teacher, Birdie Mathews, who involved her class in an "International Correspondence Exchange Program" in 1939 – began a letter exchange between Anne and Margot Frank and Juanita and Betty Wagner. The family left Iowa for California in the 1950's – Betty Ann lived in Burbank and Juanita Wagner Hiltgen lived in Redlands until her death in 2001.

The letters to the Wagner sisters, written by Anne Frank and her sister, Margot, were purchased at auction for \$165,000 by an anonymous donor in 1988 and placed on permanent display at the Simon Wiesenthal Center.

Following the Yom Hashoah Candlelighting, we hope you will join us for the fascinating first-hand story by Betty Wagner in a sixteen-minute video graciously on loan to us by the Danville, Iowa Museum.

Last month at SJI we celebrated Passover with music and a Seder presented by the school students. The youth group met for planning a community project and the teen group for a game night. We also had a L'Dor Va Dor meeting with a fun cooking

class led by Leslie Soltz, we learn how to make Matzah Brei, and we look forward to many more.

This month, we will celebrate Israel's Independence Day "Yom Ha'atzmaut".

On the 5th day of the month of Adar 1948, David Ben-Gurion, then the head of the Jewish Agency, declared "the establishment of a Jewish state in Eretz-Israel, to be known as the State of Israel.

Growing up in Israel, we celebrated all the Jewish holidays. In Israel, however, there are more national holidays and memorial days during April and May; Yom Hashoa (Holocaust Remembrance Day), Yom Hazikaron (Memorial Day), Yom Ha'atzmaut (Independence Day) and Yom Yerushalaim (Jerusalem Day) which celebrates the reunification of the city in 1967. Because these national days and holidays are all during April and May, in Israel, this time of the year is very emotional and intense.

Israel will celebrate its 73rd birthday and it is an important historical place with beautiful landscapes, the Golan Heights, the green mountains of the Galilee and the sea of Galilee, the sandy shores of the Mediterranean Sea, the Dead Sea, and the Negev desert in the south, and, of course, the historic city of Jerusalem and the modern city of Tel Aviv.

Hopefully soon we will all be able to travel again, and I encourage everyone to visit Israel and explore it at least once.

Until we reopen our congregation and reunite in-person, I am looking forward to seeing you all in our family services and activities online.

Mental Health Awareness in Action

We are finishing the celebration of our great liberation from slavery, but as we begin April this year, we don't feel very free. SARS-CoV-2 still lurks around and threatens us with new variants most of us don't know how to identify or assess. Many of us have had our vaccines, but no one knows exactly how well they protect us in the new corona virus environment.

But at Passover we used our imaginations to remember how we took flight from Egyptian slavery into a strange land with only the promise of a place of our own, a place of milk and honey. The uncertainty of that time and the uncertainty of now are very different, but one way of dealing with it can be the same. Our imaginations.

Recently a temple in Boston, Massachusetts, Congregation Mishkan Tefila, created a Zoom Mussar teaching – "Mussar and Mental Health." Mussar is a Jewish practice of personal transformational and ethical development. This teaching focused on loneliness, imagination, and choice.

Many of us have been too acquainted with loneliness this past year. How many of us found our imaginations making things worse for us? How many of us used our imaginations to improve our mood? Mussar assures us we have a choice. The presenter, Alan Morinis, who's written many books on Mussar, encourages us to pay attention to where our imagination is taking us. Are we spiraling down? Is it helping to lift us up and connect us to other people, other creatures, to the trees and sky? He urges us to be aware when we're going down into that hole and to choose. Choose to employ our imagination to lift us and connect us. To help free us from loneliness, from anxiety, from despair.

Did you puzzle over the commandment to be joyful around Purim? Mussar says we actually do have a choice. Practice sending your imagination where you want to go. Maybe a land of milk and honey is not as far away as we think.





COVID CORNER Your monthly update

WHERE WE STAND

As of April 1, 2021, San Bernardino County is in the "red" tier.

It's important to remember that we're not out of the woods yet. We have a lot of members with risk factors for serious COVID-19, and many who have not been able to be vaccinated yet.

Every month, our Health and Safety Task Force meets to discuss changes to our safety protocols. This task force, made up of medical professionals, clergy, and lay leaders, works together to set guidelines which will let us safely reopen.

Even with recent activity in Spring Break hotspots like Florida as well as spikes in cases in New York and Michigan, we are anxiously optimistic about reopening very soon.

Our medical advisors tell us that it is safe to begin planning for outdoor services as well as some limited indoor events. Watch this space for news of innovative events to come at our home on Ford Street! Until then, please keep wearing your masks and staying a safe distance from each other.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: Aren't we being too cautious?

A: There is no such thing as "too cautious" when it comes to COVID-19. *None* of our members have gotten COVID-19 from any event we've held and we're not about to change that.

Q: Do I have to wear a mask in the temple building if I'm vaccinated?

A: Our rules say that any time a person is in a common area, everyone must wear a mask. COVID-19 can still potentially spread between people even if they're both vaccinated

Q: When we re-open, will things be the same?

A: We plan on following CDC guidelines when we re-open. This means that until all emergency declarations are lifted, we will not be singing together as a group. We will not be serving food and we will be requiring people from different families to stay distant from each other. Masks will still be required. If there ever was a time to say, "better safe than sorry" this is definitely it.

"Dancing" was covered by several white bands almost immediately, most notably the Mamas and the Papas. When its original writers and performers grew tired of their work being appropriated, the song was associated with "Black Power" demonstrations. "Dancing in the Street" was taken to mean "protesting," and the controversy flowed. Over time, though, the pure goodness of the song won out and today we think of it as an anthem that brings us together.

It seems to me we need some togetherness now as much as we did in 1964. We'd all like to dance together, in person. We'd all like to see and hear each other, and to never again say, "You're still muted." Indeed, let us stay unmuted, in our joy and our togetherness. Let us hope that any day now, we can once again see each other safely. Until then, I'll be here dancing... in the house. I hope you will be too.
