Dear Emanu El,

I am so grateful to be writing this bulletin to you and know that I have successfully completed 2 of my very important lifesaving surgeries. I am grateful to be in community with such wonderful people who encourage their rabbi to take care of my health and well-being, as that is good for our everyone.

This has been a long journey for me, one that started many years before. I was diagnosed with the BRACA 2 Gene 13 years ago, before my son Isaiah was even in my belly. As one can imagine receiving important genetic information which greatly influences one's choices and timing of having children was something that weighed on me heavily at that time. Advised by my doctors, I began a journey of education and started to look at a timeline for surgical procedures to increase my length of life and decrease my ability to contract a number of cancers. I am grateful for a very talented medical team that are experts in these genes and the affects they can have on women of my age range. They expertly advise me and have incredible reputations of conducting these lifesaving surgeries.

I am looking forward to sharing this journey with each of you in our community. I cannot recommend more that you learn your genetic make-up and the implications that it may have on your personal and familial health. Thanks to my father's journey I was blessed to learn this information early enough to make decisions for my own health and well-being.

I am choosing to take this action prophylactically and do not have any form of cancer. I have learned there is strength and power in choosing life, as our tradition impels us. To choose life from a healthy position puts me in community with a worldwide group of Previvors, who have made similar decisions. I send you my deepest gratitude for your well wishes and care, and I hope to recover swiftly and once again be in community to celebrate together.

Cantorial Comments

The OMER, Rebirth & Infertility – Mental Health Awareness Month

Shiviti Adonai l'negdi tamid ...I set the Eternal before me always. Ps.16:8



Ah...spring! 'Tis the season of Birth! Renewal! *Passover* to *Shavuot*... the time we count each day of the *Omer* – 49 days or 7 weeks from the spring awakening of *Pesach* to the Revelation of receiving the Torah, our celebration of *Shavuot*, also known as the Feast of Weeks. We also begin the 4th book of the Torah – *Bamidbar*, [Literally 'Numbers' or 'wilderness'] as we continue our spiritual and physical journeys.

In addition to marking our seasonal 'countdown', May is Mental Health awareness month. Thanks to our co-chairs, Heidi Nimmo and Nancy Sidhu, we have been gifted greater awareness regarding issues leading to depression, bi-polar, addictive behaviors etc. which have been stigmatized and considered taboo far too long, especially, but not only in our

Jewish communities.

At this season of seeding and sowing, let us also consider the issue of infertility, the sufferers of which often hide their shame in the shadows, especially with cultural pressures and the knowledge that we are commanded in Genesis 1:28 "*p'ru ur'vu*" to *'be fruitful and multiply'*. It's been awhile now that my husband and I were struggling on the road to have a child, going through the devastation of miscarriage and wilderness of infertility treatments until we had an infant in our arms, thanks to the joy of adoption. After eighteen years, we still remember and can empathize with couples who are struggling with infertility and loss. And we cannot overlook or 'other' those who may choose not to have children at all.

In her essay "Out of the Shadows: An Infertility Story" Mimi Hopper, a contributor to Reform Judaism, gives a biblical spin on the pain of infertility. I have excerpted a few paragraphs to share with you.

[Out of the Shadows: An Infertility Story](#) By Mimi Hopper

...I began to see the story of Sarah and Hagar in a new light. When Sarah is unable to conceive with Abraham, she instructs him to build a family through her maid Hagar, who becomes pregnant immediately. Soon after, Sarah mistreats Hagar, who is cast out with her son Ishmael into the wilderness.

...I had always thought that Sarah's ill treatment of Hagar and Ishmael revealed weaknesses in her character. She was fickle, jealous, and cruel. But experiencing my own deep yearning to become pregnant, I understood why Sarah wanted to banish the woman who, for her, had become the embodiment of her inadequacy. Hagar's increasing joyousness in her growing belly became Sarah's daily reminder of what she wanted so badly and could not have herself...

...It is imperative that we end the silence surrounding infertility. Practically everyone knows someone who has gone through infertility treatments, but few open up about it. Only after I became vocal about our struggle did three friends tell me they either had IVF or are going through it now. The inability to conceive is not shameful; it's a condition as ancient as our people. Our community needs to hear the voices of our Sarahs, and to give our mothers, daughters, wives, and sisters the support, body and soul, they require and deserve.

May this Mental Health Awareness month heighten our sensibilities on all levels. At Shavuot, the receiving of the Torah at Sinai, we are reminded that we were all there together and while we were created '*B'zelem Elohim*', we each have our personal journeys and challenges to overcome that enable us to **strengthen and be strengthened by one another**; sharing our stories - our heartaches and our joys, is another way we build compassion, empathy and understanding. **Chazak, Chazak, v'nitchazek!**

From Our Director of Education & Youth



Our school year is coming to an end. I look back, and I am very proud and thankful for our teachers Leah and Keeana and our Madricha Clara, for doing such a great job in teaching our students both Hebrew and Judaica in trying times.

I am also proud of our remarkable students. They joined online to learn and participate in our different activities about holidays and Jewish traditions. While we were physically distant and missed seeing everyone in person, it was good to meet on Sunday mornings, starting with community time, all of us together with Rick and Addie and their lovely, fun music before each class joined its breakout room for Hebrew and Judaica classes.

I also want to mention our wonderful toddlers who joined once a month to learn about Jewish holidays. And finally, I want to thank the youth and teens for joining the learning and game nights.

The end of the school year will be on May 23rd, a week after Shavuot. Shavuot is one of the three pilgrimage festivals and it also commemorates the anniversary of giving the Torah on Mount Sinai.

From the second Passover night we are counting the Omer for seven weeks. We will celebrate the holiday of Shavuot (שבועות, or the feast of weeks) at the end of this seven weeks on May 16th.

I love Shavuot and this time of the year when the weather here in SoCal is actually very similar to the one in Israel. In Israel, it is accustomed to celebrating and remembering the times when Bnei Israel brought their first harvest to the Temple in Jerusalem in parades and festivals in which the farmers present their crops. Other customs of Shavuot are staying up all night studying Jewish texts in what is called a Tikkun and reading of the book of Ruth.

One of my favorite Israeli songs is called "Sof Ze Tamid Hatchala" meaning "The end is always a beginning". This month we end the school year at SJL, but it is also the beginning of our summer break. Now when many people are getting vaccinated it is also the beginning of better times. Hopefully soon, we will meet in-person again.

All around the building and in town people would be wearing green ribbons to remind us that Each Mind Matters and that we are continuing to shred the stigma of mental illness. But this is May 2021, our second living through a global pandemic. Last May it was all new and, we thought, very temporary. We were getting familiar with this stranger called Zoom. Now Zooming is practically a way of life for many of us.

One of our congregants recently said she was forgetting how to socialize. Aren't we all? And she asked for patience. Don't we all need that? And understanding.

Many of us have our vaccines now and want to jump right back in. Others urge caution as we see how they work on new variants of the coronavirus. Some are still waiting. Yes, we're wearing spring green this month, but we're still flashing yellow caution lights.

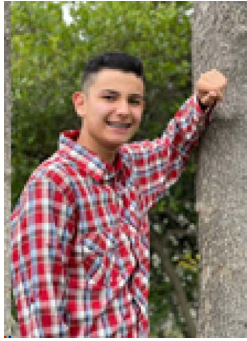
