#### **Rabbinic Reflections**



This has been a very strange time. We are once again living in unprecedented times. No one expected that at this time this year, many would opt to join services online only nor did we think our vaccines would possibly need boosters. How could we have predicted the division on the left and right, the rise in anti-Semitism or the attacks on Zionist thinking and the State of Israel? When we think about all of this in one moment, it can be extremely overwhelming and depressing. I am here to tell you there is hope. There is another side to this wild time in history that we are living through, and like all things the only constant is change. So we pray for a change for the better.

As I write this we are still in the month of Elul. When you read this it will be almost Rosh Hashanah. I have found meaning and renewal during these uncertain times by grounding myself in Jewish tradition. Part of my daily practice has been reading as much as I can about Elul, reciting

Psalm 27, and digging into Jewish inspirational texts, listening to podcasts, and creating daily videos for you. I have found that diving deeper into Jewish learning, teaching, chanting, and daily meditation keeps me focused on what really matters in life. The pandemic for many of us has cleared out our social calendars and given us back time that we haven't had in years. I've found quiet meditation and peace that comes from connecting daily with the divine when I sit quietly in my meditation space and breathe inviting God in.

Elie Wiesel, who was all too aware of hopeless situations once said, "One must wager on the future. I believe it is possible, in spite of everything, to believe in friendship in a world without friendship, and even to believe in God in a world where there has been an eclipse of God's face...we must not give in to cynicism. To save the life of a single child, no effort is too much. To make a tired old man smile is to perform an essential task. To defeat injustice and misfortune, if only for one instant, for a single victim, is to invent a new reason to hope."

As we walk into a new Jewish year, I want to invite you to experience the power of community and hope by engaging more deeply in Congregation Emanu El. We have created a huge variety of online and outdoor in person offerings for you and your family this holiday season. Read our High Holyday guide, pick a few services to check out, or all, and join us for a spiritual re-boot during these wild times. Together as one community, we will create hope for ourselves, our families, our community, and our world. Join us in creating a year of renewal and hope with Congregation Emanu El.

#### **Cantorial Comments**



Zochreinu l'chayim - Remember us for life... Inscribe us in the Book of Life! [HHD Amidah]

A new year! A sweet year! Fresh possibilities of hope, health, peace, blessings... what we all will surely be praying for – for ourselves, our loved ones, our community, our nation and our world.

As I write this article, one thing is certain – in a few short weeks, we will celebrate together! What is still uncertain however, is the 'how' and 'with whom'?! How many of you will be at outdoor services? How many of you will be tuning in virtually from your living rooms or dining room tables? And from what parts of the country?

The month of Elul has been preparing us spiritually – giving us time to gaze inward, ask the tough questions, like why did I say that? Or...why didn't I? How did I really cope during the [still ongoing]

pandemic? What changes have occurred within? Was I too hard on myself instead of trying to be more compassionate and accepting of these difficult challenges we have been facing? What areas of my life can I infuse with greater intention and mindfulness?

Within our High Holy Day worship, the *Unetane tokef* prayer ['we shall ascribe holiness to this day"] is perhaps the pinnacle of the Rosh Hashanah liturgy. In the dramatic poem when the question is asked: 'Who shall live and who shall die?,' the response takes the form of three important words that we sing, mimicking resounding blasts of a horn: *U'tshuvah*, *U'tefilah*, *Utz'dakah'*! 'Repentance, Prayer and Charity can avert the severe decree.' We cannot control the hour of our passing but we can perform *mitzvot* and strive to enrich our lives with meaning and acts of lovingkindness.

We are living through greater uncertainty than ever. And yet... was life *ever* predictable? It was the Greek philosopher, Heraclitus, who said "Change is the only constant in life." We read in the Talmud that "A person should always be soft like a reed, and not be stiff like a cedar." How easy it is to become set in our ways. Ironically, while the inevitable changes surrounding us are not in our control, our habitual behaviors are well within our reach. If we learned anything from this past year, it is that we need to exercise flexibility and adaptability. As one of my colleagues posted, the key word for now is 'Pivot'! This is the time for turning and change. *Tshuvah*!

May this New Year, 5782, be an opportunity for growth, positive change and compassion, and may you and your loved ones be blessed with joy, health, peace and harmony –

#### **Mental Health Awareness in Action**

We have an issue of scale. That is, how should we look at mental issues and illness? As problems solely of the individual who experiences them? Or at a larger societal level that fosters possibly unhealthy conditions that then bring about mental problems? Small scale, large scale?

This is the same vexing question we have been dealing with for a year and a half. Should we deal with the coronavirus solely on an individual basis? Or do we bring in strong public health measures to curb the pandemic? Personal decision-making or collective responsibility?

In mental health, several prominent and poignant examples come to mind. Destructive addiction to opioids – should we look at it only an issue of individual physical pain leading to addiction then often overdosing? Or should we examine the prevalence of societal despair that often underlies and accompanies, the addiction, as well as the profit motive in pharmaceutical production in our health care system?

Our fabulous American gymnast Simone Biles is another example. We can choose to see her withdrawal from much of this summer's Olympics competitions as solely her personal mental distress. Or we can examine the nature of the whole Olympics system that may be putting unhealthy stresses on athletes.

Psychology and psychiatry have tended to view and treat mental illness as an individual problem. And yet public health professionals and others clearly see that in the U.S. and other countries, we humans have what some call an epidemic of depression. Shouldn't we ask why? And why are there so many suicides in some countries? Surely we need to look more broadly than the individual stories.

Right now we have an experienced Surgeon General of the United States, Vice Admiral and Dr. Vivek H. Murthy. During his years out of office, 2017-2021, he spent his time working on questions of public health underlying mental/emotional distress that brings on physical andmental illness. He even wrote a book, *Together: The Healing Power of Human Connection in a Sometimes Lonely World* (2020). In future articles for Mental Health Awareness In Action we'll be delving into what he's been discovering and thinking about. There's lots of wisdom there.

But as we enter the year 5782, this is a good time to think more deeply about mental illness and how some Tikkun Olam, making changes to our society, might help to ease mental/emotional stress. Wishing all goodness in our new year. May this be the year we can come back and be together. We need each other.

Dear Emanu El Community,

Following considerable thought and consultation, we have reluctantly decided that **all High Holy Day services will be either Outdoors or Online**. We will no longer have an In-person Indoor option. As stated in our previous letter about the pandemic, the situation is constantly changing and we must adapt in order to keep health and safety as our highest priority.

#### How has the schedule changed?

**Outdoor Services**: The Erev Rosh Hashanah service will now be Outdoors in the CEE Parking Lot with masking and distancing, as well as online. Other Outdoor Services include S'lichot, Shofar Service (9 am First Day of Rosh Hashanah), Tashlich, and Sukkot, in addition to Children's Rosh Hashanah/ Yom Kippur Services.

**Online Services:** All other services (Rosh Hashanah Day One at 10 am, Rosh Hashanah Day Two, Erev Yom Kippur, and Yom Kippur All Day) will be online only. These services will be broadcast live from the Sanctuary on Zoom and Facebook Live.

There will be much to enjoy online, including a new, improved view of the Sanctuary provided by updated cameras and the uplifting music of the choir. Celebrate after services by participating in virtual onegs with festive activities being planned by Board members. Watch for details!

#### Why were these changes made?

Clergy and leadership have consulted in depth with members of our Health and Safety Task Force and others. Our resident epidemiologist has voiced concern that Covid case numbers in San Bernardino and Riverside Counties have not yet peaked and the rates of vaccination are still well below the state average. From reports of some fully vaccinated individuals with "long Covid" from breakthrough infections to data from Israel about waning protection leading to recommendations for boosters, many of us are finding reasons for increased caution.

We care deeply about the health and safety of each one of you! At this challenging time, let us join together to celebrate safely. May we find strength and hope in our Emanu El community.




