Rabbinic Reflections



"The Lord appeared to him by the terebinths of Mamre; he was sitting at the entrance of the tent as the day grew hot." (Genesis 18:1) In the Book of Genesis we read of Abraham's journey. He is sitting at the entrance to his tent, according to the Talmud recovering from surgery, when God, or angels appear to him. Abraham who believed deeply in extending hospitality immediately responded, told his wife Sarah to prepare food and greeted the guests with the best hospitality, despite his own recovery. Abraham is a model for us in how we must extend our welcome to all who enter our congregational home. We have certainly learned during these pandemic

times the difference a phone call, a smile, a note in the mail, or kind listening ear can make in another human beings life.

In November we welcome you back Emanu El. This pandemic has kept us apart, being safe and thriving online, but as the holidays approach, we long to be together safely and too celebrate. Please join us on Friday November 5th at 6:30pm in our sanctuary. We will be gathering safely indoors for those who are vaccinated and be able to enjoy the sacredness of Shabbat and togetherness as one community. Cantorial Comments



A number of parallels have been made between our Sukkot holiday which concludes the High Holy Day season, and this month's national holiday of Thanksgiving.

In his 2019 article from the Jerusalem Post, Micah Halpern explains. "... Puritans, who settled in New England, were the first people to celebrate our Thanksgiving. They were well versed in the Bible and knew that Sukkot, translated as the Feast of Tabernacles or the Feast of Booths, was the harvest holiday. They also knew that it was celebrated during the fall season. The Puritans also saw themselves as the Israelites. Today we would say they "identified" as Israelites. They compared their voyage across the Atlantic to the Children of Israel crossing the Red Sea; they viewed the tribulations and hardships of their first years in their new land as the time the Israelites spent wandering through the desert. Their lives were dependent on nature, on rain and on the sun. And they w way of a feast

expressed their gratitude by way of a feast ... "

But I think what really stands out with both of these holidays, is the focus on hospitality to the 'stranger' and gratitude. At Sukkot, the *ushpizin - the* Aramaic word for visitors -- it is important to acknowledge our guests in the sukkah - those of past generations and those we invite to '*leisheiv basukkah*' - to sit in the sukkah and share a meal. At Passover, it is customary to invite someone outside of your 'circle' of friends or family. And of course, we do the same at Thanksgiving, which since 2007 has been called by some people as "Friendsgiving".

One of my favorite spiritual teachers from the Institute for Jewish Spirituality (IJS) with which I've been connected for fifteen years, is Sheila Pelz Weinberg – author, poet, rabbi,teacher. Among other publications, she is the author of <u>God Loves</u> the Stranger, a collection of stories, poems and prayers. Here is an excerpt from one of Rabbi Weinberg's poems:

"Adonai is mindful of strangers; Immigrants, those under surveillance, from those places, the ones nobody knows, nobody talks to, the odd, the weird, the differently abled; With foreign accents, without family, without friends; Without status, without protection, without regard, without homes, without insurance, without unions, without credit cards, without credentials; Without documents.

Adonai keeps an eye on them all.

They are under God's watch.

Their destiny is God's concern.

Their protection is God's business.

It is human work..."

In Psalm 136 we sing: *Hodu l'adonai ki tov [Psalm 136]* Give thanks to Adonai for what is good. We perform sacred work - deeds of mitzvot in those everyday moments when we can offer a helping hand or simply a smile to a stranger who might just become a friend.... *Chag Thanksgiving Sameach*!
