Rabbinic Reflections



Emanu El,

I write you one last time for this month's bulletin. For those of you who are not aware, I will be leaving Congregation Emanu El as of June 30th to explore new Rabbinic ventures. Check our Constant Contact email to read the letter I sent to our community about this choice. A copy has been mailed to all members as well.

We are once again in strange times in the world as I write these words. The fall of Roe v. Wade happened this past week, a sad moment for our country and the implications that it will have on womens' health care and life-saving measures for so many in the world with a

uterus. At the same time division in our America only seems to be widening. The struggle to survive financially as a religious institution remains a tough uphill battle, as resources are slim. The pandemic has not disappeared much to everyone's desires, and COVID cases are back on the rise. It can feel overwhelming to simply exist in this world, let alone watch the news.

While I can say I once lived a life of blissful ignorance about the struggles of those who came before me, I was grateful that choice existed. I was grateful that the Jewish world had so many different institutions to offer those seeking sacred Jewish community, but today that too is becoming more limited. The glory days of our past can no longer be taken for granted. The future will look very different than what was even twenty years ago. The sooner we accept that the better. Our Jewish tradition teaches us to learn from the past, but look toward the future. We do ourselves and future generations a disservice when we spend too much time looking backwards.

I must admit as a post-Roe child, I was lucky enough to exist in a world where access to healthcare was not an issue for most of my life. But now as a parent, a Rabbi, and an advocate for those with uteruses I am outraged and horrified. We now live in a country which no longer holds those protections sacred.

The time to organize and step up is now. Our Jewish tradition is very clear on this issue. One Talmud text teaches that for the first 40 days of pregnancy a fetus is merely water, and has no legal status at all. Then from the end of that period to the end of pregnancy the fetus is considered a part of the pregnant person's body, "its Mother's thigh" the Talmud says. Again the fetus is secondary to the adult human carrying it. In the Mishnah, it is stated that if abortion is called for to save a life, it is blessed. The baby comes into consideration once it has emerged from the mother's body. Judaism permits abortion when carrying the fetus to term would cause woe, risks to mental health, physical health, or dignity of the mother. Therefore abortion access is a matter of religious freedom.

People who are denied access to reproductive care are more likely to live in poverty and remain in abusive relationships. These recent laws require us as a people to step up, not stand idly by, put our Jewish values forward and fight for the rights for those who will suffer as a result of this legislation. There are so many ways to fight and pray with your feet. This weekend my family and I got on our feet and protested. You can also make sure you help empower people to vote in the November elections. Phone bank, and educate your community about candidates and choices. You can donate and support organizations that are making a difference. A few wonderful organizations doing this work include those funded by the National Council of Jewish Women, *jewsforabortionaccess.org*, an organization that will make sure people have access to abortion care *abortionondemand.org* and another way for people to take care of an abortion safely from home include *plancpills.org*.

The reality is our Jewish landscape is changing rapidly. The COVID-19 pandemic only sped up the process. Our voices are needed in this conversation to show that religion and faith-abiding people are not all bad. Our Jewish faith supports women's right to healthcare and fundamental rights. Educate yourself, speak with your neighbors and friends, organize, fund, teach and support those in need.

I will miss being your spiritual leader and am grateful for your support, friendship and love over the past four years. Please stay in touch and reach out should you need anything!

Mental Health Awareness in Action Gardening

Modern humans are always studying something, and our favorite subject seems to be us. What are our preferences in morning cereals, in political messages, beliefs and opinions of all sorts? Some of these studies are out to influence us. Many spring from simple curiosity about what kind of animal we are. What is our nature? What are our needs?

Lately people are curious about how our surroundings and our activities influence our moods and general well-being. And our behavior, too.

For example, a study a few years ago found that when vacant lots in an inner U.S. city neighborhood were planted with bushes and trees, violence in that area diminished. Another city study took 3 small areas and treated the vacant lots in different ways. In one, nothing was done (the control). In another, all the junk was removed from the lots and kept clean. And in the third area, all the lots were planted with trees and shrubs. Then random pedestrians were stopped and asked how they felt right then, their current moods. Do you think the researchers were surprised to find that where the lots were green and alive, the passersby felt more cheerful?

Very recently, researchers found that people who reported handling the pandemic the very best were gardeners. Home gardeners reported the least distress at the changes imposed on their lives by COVID-19.

Other researchers find that gardening helps not only every day kinds of moods but also more serious, diagnosable mental problems. Serious depression and anxiety seem to be more tolerable, even lightened, when people garden. There's a book neither of us has read yet but with a winning title: *The Well-Gardened Mind*. The author, Sue Stuart-Smith is a gardener but also a psychiatrist-psychotherapist in Britain,. Her subtitle is "The Restorative Power of Nature," and she really means it.

Some might suggest we include in our gardens some vegetables so we can enjoy the fruits of our labors. Others say the flower colors and the greenness are enough. And some of us don't have even a little garden plot or can't manage the work. But we suggest an alternative – not the same, of course – but frequent walks in your neighborhood to look at the progress of all the local gardeners can be full of delightful surprises and no-nonsense beauty. And beauty is an antidote to every kind of trouble.

Rabbi Gershon Winkler says paying close attention to all the living green, the living soil, is a kind of "Soul Presence," and he it calls "transformative and healing." We think so, too.
