Cantorial Comments



What is YOUR story? What is your Song? Who are you and Where are you? Please mark your calendars for the ELUL EXPERIENCE – August 28th

Most of us are familiar with the teaching from *Pirkei Avot* (Teachings of our Ancestors) Chapter 2:16 (Rabbi Tarfon) used to say... "It is not up to you to finish the task, but neither are you at liberty to desist from it."

We have a sacred task: All of us with any connection to Congregation Emanu El, be it decades-long, or only recent, need to pull together with all of the energies and resources we can muster – not just financially, but physically, intellectually, spiritually and creatively in the year ahead.

This is a challenging time for so many of us with the departure of my dear colleague, Rabbi Reznick. After thirteen years of accompanying you through many other bumpy journeys, in this coming year I am committed to continue to be the best support I can be, with integrity and compassion, as your spiritual leader. Rachel Naomi Remen, in her book "My Grandfather's Blessing" shares this story:

A medical colleague describing his own experience of staying true to himself told me that he thinks of his life as an orchestra. Reclaiming his integrity reminds him of that moment before the concert when the concertmaster asks the oboist to sound an A. "At first there is chaos and noise, as all the parts of the orchestra try to align themselves with that note. But as each instrument moves closer and closer to it, the noise diminishes and when they all finally sound it together, there is a moment of rest, of homecoming."

That is how it feels to me," he told me. "I am always tuning my orchestra. Somewhere deep there is a sound that is mine alone, and I struggle daily to hear it and tune my life to it. Sometimes there are people and situations that help me to hear my note more clearly; other times, people and situations make it harder for me to hear. A lot depends on my commitment to listening and my intention to stay coherent with this note. It is only when my life is tuned to my note that I can play life's mysterious and holy music without tainting it with my own discordance, my own bitterness, resentment, agendas, and fears."

We all have many notes and stories – but somehow, it is the love of Judaism that brings us all together, despite our differences. How can we make our lives sing, be part of the orchestra or choir, but not lose our own focus, listen intently and dig deeply into the wells of our truth? Sharing stories, listening to one another is crucial to all of our relationships. Congregational Emanu El members share history. Stories. Connections. Celebrations. Sorrows. The greatest blessing for me has been the many relationships I have forged over these many years. That is why I still choose to be here. I want you to know that I am here for you and can be reached by all the usual modes of communication – email, phone, texting...as well as arranging to meet in person when I am in Redlands for services, special meetings or classes.

Many of you attend our beloved member, Heidi Nimmo's, Sacred Story on Thursday mornings. [All are welcome!] Our stories are many and they are all sacred. What brought you to Redlands? How long have you been here? How did you find Congregation Emanu El? What is your Jewish journey about? How do our Jewish teachings and values provide spiritual nourishment as well as challenging struggles for you? I want to hear them so that together in the year ahead, we can strive to tune our sacred orchestra to reinvigorate the melodious visions of those who came before us and, G-d willing, for the next generation as well. What other choice do we have?

Mental Health Awareness in Action 9-8-8

Do you know 988?

On July 16, last month, pressing 988 on your phone became a new way to get help in coping with suicidal thoughts and plans. It's a new shorter number of the **National Suicide Prevention Lifeline**. The old number, 1-800-273-8255, still works, but 988 is a lot easier to remember and faster to press. You can also text. And they have help in Spanish, too.

Where does 988 get you to? It's still the same National Lifeline with over 200 Lifeline centers. In California, we have 13 centers, though almost all of them are in Northern Cal. In the south we have one in LA's Century City and one in San Diego. The centers appreciate volunteers, both professionals and devoted citizens. And most of them need financial support. There is also a "chat" function on their website https://suicidepreventionlifeline.org. And lots of information there about risk factors and warning signs of suicide and where to get help.

However, as of this time, many are worried that the National Lifeline doesn't have adequate capacity to handle all the calls that may come in on 988. Even before 988, many states have been having problems getting calls answered promptly. The issue, as often, is money. We don't have sufficient sustainable funding sources in many states. There is an overflow feature that sends calls out of state to national centers, but even those are imperfect. So, how this works in practice, we will all find out as the months develop.

In the meantime, as we can keep 988 in mind and spread the word, we need to keep talking about rising suicide rates and speaking up fearlessly to end the stigma.

We have a special power for good when we are open listeners for family and friends. Often someone listening and caring is the encouragement a person needs to seek treatment.

Sunday, August 7th 11:00 a.m. - Noon

Tisha B'Av, the Ninth Day of Av, commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. The First Temple was destroyed by the Babylonians in 586 BCE, the rebuilt Second Temple was destroyed by the Romans in 70 CE. It was established in the Jewish calendar as a Day of Mourning and over the centuries it has become a time to also sadly reflect on a number of other tragedies that have befallen the Jewish People. It is on Tisha B'Av that the biblical scroll of Lamentations is read and studied. It is also, traditionally, a day of fasting.

We will have an Hour of Reflection on the morning of Tisha B'av - Sunday, August 7th from 11:00 to noon. We will gather in our dimmed sanctuary and recall the exiles and persecutions our People has faced - times when whole communities were destroyed, times when Jews were banished from various kingdoms, times when Jews suffered pogroms and death for being Jewish. We will especially reflect on the Holocaust when Jews drank more deeply than ever before from the cup of sorrow.

Rabbi Cohn will lead this Hour of Reflection during which portions of the Scroll of Lamentations will be read and special readings will be included. All are invited are invited to participate in this solemn Hour of Reflection.



"A God We Can Believe In"

Are you a thoughtful individual for whom belief in God seems either impossible, not credible, or just plain fanciful? Do the stories and legends attributed to God and God's powers strike you as too supernatural or mythical to be taken seriously? Do you wonder how God can really exist in a world where the innocent suffer as much as they do? Do you think about moving beyond personal free-form spirituality but are not sure how—or who to trust?

"A God We Can Believe In", just published a few weeks ago, is edited by Rabbi Richard Agler and Rabbi Rifat Sonsino. Our own Rabbi Cohn is the author of one of the 28 chapters that make up this new book. His chapter on "Reverent Agnosticism" deals with the question of "What to Believe and Not to Believe About God."
