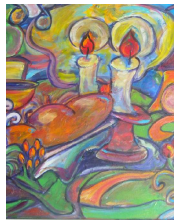

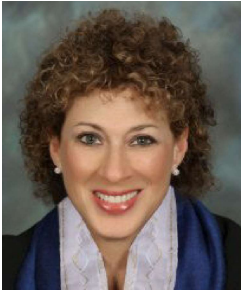

Presidential Perspectives



There has been considerable discussion by our membership that Congregation Emanu El will be closing. ***Nothing could be further from the truth.*** As with many suburban synagogues, finances and membership are always an issue. The Board of Directors

has taken steps to minimize those issues and we are finalizing our action plan for the next five years. Included in this short-term plan is our intent to hire a Rabbi. Once this short-term plan is finalized, we will begin working on a long-term plan.

If you haven't noticed (and based on attendance you haven't) we are now holding services at the Temple each Friday night as well as selected Saturday services. We are focusing on doing as much in-person as we can to return to normalcy. Cantor Bern-Vogel is leading the majority of our Shabbat services with an occasional lay-led service. We had a well-attended High Holy Days, both in-person and on Zoom. The School for Jewish Living is back in session led by Sheri Maltzman. (If you have children who are not enrolled yet, please see her as soon as possible). The Seniors for Seniors program is back again and in-person led by Margie Orland. The programs are fun and include a luncheon. We have completed repair of the parking lot lighting and are preparing other repairs and property improvement including the start of the Boruchin Israeli Garden project that will add beauty and value to our facility. We have had two successful fund-raising events and we are exploring additional possibilities such as renting out our building for large gatherings as well as afternoon meetings of various organizations.

That doesn't sound like a Temple that is closing. We plan on much more in the coming months and need your attendance and participation. If you have suggestions for activities, and are willing to help lead and organize those activities, please let me know.

Mental Health Awareness in Action

“Quiet quitting” is a new term we’re gradually learning about. It’s not actually quitting, but it’s a kind of retreat from full engagement on the job. A kind of protest. A kind of dropping out. However, we know we can’t truly ‘quit.’ We need a job. But clearly something is amiss when people ‘quietly quit; in fact there’ are so many of them that there’s a new phrase for what’s happening.

Our U.S. Surgeon General, Dr. Vivek Murthy, has definitely noticed. His recent response is the Surgeon General’s Framework for Mental Health and Well-Being in the Workplace, released in late October 2022. Only last year he released a report on Youth Mental Health. This surgeon general is dedicated to helping all of us achieve full well-being.

The comprehensiveness of Dr. Murthy’s framework is proof of his understanding of the complex and deep needs we all have for meaning and connection, as well as the more obvious things like physical safety on the job. And he does not forget the need for psychological safety.

He names 5 pillars as:

1. Protection from harm
2. Connection and community
3. Work-life harmony
4. Mattering at work, and
5. Opportunities for growth

Many people talk about these issues. Dr. Murthy and his staff go into details of what needs to happen to achieve these goals.

Just to take one of these, “Mattering at Work,” he specifies that we need a living wage, that we need to be involved in deciding *how* to get our tasks done successfully, that our bosses and colleagues need to develop a “culture of gratitude and recognition” for our work, and that the workplace should help us gain an understanding of where our individual work fits with the overall mission of the organization. Knowing that we individually matter to the organization is important for our well-being. It’s part of our sense of meaning in our lives. And there are ways to encourage it right at work, every day.

Dr. Murthy goes beyond the superficial and really thinks about what our deeper hearts and minds need for a good life, a satisfying life. More on his workplace framework later.

A Ceremony for Each Night of Chanukah 5783-2022

Chanukah begins on Sunday evening, December 18th. Each home should have its own Menorah (or, Chanukiya). The entire family should participate in the lighting of the Chanukah candles. On the first night, light the candle on the extreme right in addition to the *Shamash*. On successive nights add one additional candle immediately to the left and kindle the newest candle first. Follow the same procedure each night, always adding from right to left but always lighting from left to right.

The following might be said each night before lighting the candles:

First Night-Freedom (Sunday - December 18, 2022)



We kindle these Chanukah lights in remembrance of the dedication and courage of the Maccabees. Believing that it was their right to be free to worship as their hearts and minds dictated, they willingly gave their lives for freedom. Now, kindling these candles we rededicate ourselves to work for the equal rights of all and for the realization of a world of democracy and freedom.

Second Night-Family (Monday - December 19, 2022)



Tonight as we celebrate Chanukah together, we are conscious of the precious gift of family. So often we take one another for granted, forgetting to express our love and devotion. Let us, now, as we kindle these festive lights, rededicate ourselves to sharing our interests and time with one another. Through kindness and thoughtfulness our love for one another will increase from strength to strength.

Third Night-Torah (Tuesday = December 20, 2022)



On this third night of Chanukah we rededicate ourselves to the study of our tradition. As the Maccabees courageously fought to preserve our faith, we too are duty-bound to sustain our heritage by deepening our understanding of it through study. By increasing our knowledge of Judaism we become more sensitive to its abiding values, more aware of our responsibility to realize these values in our society.

Fourth Night-Hope (Wednesday - December 21, 2022)



Our ancestors taught that hope illumines the way. Ours are times when many live in fear and great despair. Like the Maccabees we need to build our lives on the hope that truth will ultimately triumph over falsehood, that confidence, knowledge and understanding will finally depose superstition and tyranny.

Fifth Night-Charity (Thursday - December 22, 2022)



Our tradition tells us that during the Maccabean war for freedom all Jews, both children and adults, contributed charity toward the cause of defeating the oppressor. There are many forms of oppression still existent in our world today. There are people afflicted by sickness, hunger, ignorance, and prejudice. We rededicate ourselves to providing food for the hungry, medicine for the sick, knowledge for the ignorant, and equal opportunity to those afflicted by prejudice.

Sixth Night-Peace (Friday - December 23, 2022)

(Erev Shabbat - Light Chanukah Candles BEFORE Shabbat candles)



Today one of our foremost tasks is to secure peace in our troubled world. When we seek to end disagreements through understanding, when we mend hurt and wounded feelings, we are doing our part in making peace a living ideal. Let us rededicate ourselves to the task of securing peace.

Seventh Night-Equality (Saturday - December 24, 2022)

(Motzai Shabbat - Light Chanukah Candles AFTER Havdalah)



Equality is founded on total respect for the liberty and freedom of all people. Our Chanukah lights serve as a reminder that all people are secure only when we honor the precious liberty and rights of our neighbors.

Eighth Night-Faith (Sunday - December 25, 2022)



Tonight ALL of the candles in our Menorah are lit. The Menorah has been a symbol of Jewish faith. Let us uncover the many treasures of Jewish faith.

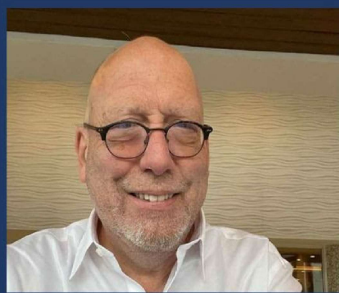

THE IMAM AND THE RABBI



Imam Abdullah Antepli is a globally acknowledged leader in inter-religious dialogue. He directs (with Yossi Klein Halevi) the Shalom Hartman Institute's Muslim Leadership Initiative. Born in Turkey, he served as Duke University's first Muslim chaplain; its director of Center for Muslim Life, and teaches in the Duke Divinity School. The NonProfit Times recognized him as one of their Power & Influence Top 50 leaders of 2019, calling him one of the most prominent Muslim leaders in higher education today.



Rabbi Jeffrey K. Salkin is one of American Judaism's most prolific and most-quoted rabbis. His blog, "Martini Judaism: for those who want to be shaken and stirred," published by the Religion News Service, won a 2022 Wilbur Award for best religion blog of the year. His essays have appeared in the Washington Post, Tablet, Mosaic, Forward, and Commentary. He has written ten books on bar/bat mitzvah, Israel, masculinity, and Jewish culture, as well as three Torah commentaries. He serves as the rabbi of Temple Israel in West Palm Beach, Florida.
