

Cantorial Comments



PURIM, HEALING SERVICE & RABBI MARY ZAMORE, author of "The Sacred Table"

We all love Hamentashen, know a little something about the Book of Esther and enjoy receiving and giving *Shalach Manot*. Here are some Purim facts you might not know, by Biblical scholar and Hebraist, Professor Adele Berlin, who has published commentaries on the Book of Esther among others...

The Book of Esther serves as the authorizing document for Purim, a holiday that is not mentioned in the Torah. But the Megillah's mandate differs from the Torah's in one crucial respect: it is careful not to say that God commanded the observance of Purim. In fact, God is nowhere mentioned in the book and this absence emphasizes the distinction between the Torah and its festivals on the one hand and the Megillah and its festival on the other. The Megillah makes no suggestion that Purim is an ancient festival that had been forgotten or neglected. Purim is clearly a new festival, of recent origin.

Esther is the most "secular" of the biblical books, making no reference to God's name, to the Temple, to prayer, or to distinctive Jewish practices such as *kashrut* [keeping kosher]. Yet Esther, of all the biblical books outside of the Torah, is the only one that addresses the origin of a new festival. For this reason, if for no other, Esther should be considered a "religious" book. Its main concern, the very reason for its existence, is to establish Purim as a Jewish holiday for all generations.

Another successful rhetorical strategy is the combination of a serious theme and a comic style. The threat of the destruction of the Jews is no laughing matter, but the Book of Esther is hilariously funny. The raucous Persian court, with its lavish display of luxury and its pervasive drinking parties, is not the setting we expect for the impending annihilation of the Jewish people. The plot glories in revelry and bawdiness (and this may be the primary reason for the absence of God's name)

The festival of Purim brings us a uniquely irreverent and joyously optimistic celebration of Jewish identity and Jewish continuity.

SUN., MARCH 5: Join us for a festive **Purim** celebration on Sunday morning – for all ages! with a Megilla Reading, delicious HAMENTASHEN and a *FIDDLER ON THE ROOF* Purimshpiel! Costumes encouraged!!

SAT., MARCH 18: It has been awhile since we've been able to come together for a healing service – COVID, illness, grief, mourning, woes of the world – whatever stage you may be in, we hope you will join us for a Shabbat morning healing service of meditative music and special readings. Potluck Kiddush to follow.

TUES., MARCH 21: RABBI MARY ZAMORE, Executive Director of the WRN [Women's Rabbinic Network] will be leading a teaching session on March 21 @ 6:30 p.m. on zoom – just in time for Passover from her book: The Sacred Table, Creating a Jewish Food Ethic.

Presidential Perspectives



I think that March is my favorite month of the year. Michele's birthday and our anniversary fall in March (on the same day!). It is also the start of baseball season with the opening of spring training. As John Fogerty once said, "Put me in coach, I'm ready to play, today".

About 15 years ago, when the Temple was on E Street, our Rabbi asked me to be one of the speakers on Yom Kippur. The topic was, My Most Important Jewish Moment. I chose a moment in 1965 when Sanford Braun (Sandy Koufax) would not pitch in a World Series game that year because the game fell on Yom Kippur. After

my speech, that Rabbi told a joke that still makes me laugh to this day. He said, "Don Drysdale filled in for Sandy that day and was blitzed by the opponent in the first inning. As the Dodger Manager, Walt Alston, came to the mound to remove Drysdale from the game, Drysdale said, as he handed Alston the ball, 'bet you wished I was Jewish too'". Great line!

I later learned that Koufax wasn't the first to not play on Yom Kippur. Hank Greenberg, the Hall of Fame slugger from the 1930-1940's Detroit Tigers, did it as well. Another interesting note is another great left-handed pitcher, Kenny Holtzman, also wouldn't pitch on Yom Kippur and in 1966 he and Koufax were scheduled to pitch a regular season game against each other on Yom Kippur. Both pitchers pushed back their start to the next day where Holtzman beat Koufax 2-1.

So there's a little Jewish sports history, a little appropriate musical reference, and I'll add an invitation to our Purimspiel and as many Shabbat services as you can make. See you at the Temple and at the ballpark. PLAY BALL!

Mental Health Awareness in Action "Facing Suicide" 3

The young man on the Flathead Indian Reservation in Montana is in deep depression, lonely, and in pain. He decides to end his own life. He prepares. But before he acts, he texts two of his friends. They jump in the truck and make a beeline for his home, knock on the door, take him away from that darkest of emotional places, and help him get help. He involves himself more in his Native culture. He finds unparalleled joys in the beauty of his land. One of his saviors becomes his companion on regular outings, full of joking, hanging out, and lots of talking and laughing.

A woman finds she cannot bear anymore the pain engulfing her. She is sure even her growing son will be better off without her. She's no good to anyone. She is also a woman who adores shoes, and has quite a collection. She calls her aunt, who is more like a cousin in age. She tells her she is giving all her shoes to her – they share a love of shoes and have similar sized feet. What? What's going on? Why are you giving away your shoes? Soon, the aunt understands. Immediately getting off the phone, she calls 911. Before her niece has time to do anything lethal, the police are knocking at the door. She's admitted to a hospital. She gets treatment. And before the season changes, she and her aunt are sitting together on the porch comparing the new shoes they just bought.

These are two stories of real people in the PBS special, "Facing Suicide," that aired in September 2022. They are not unusual stories. More people are stopped from attempting suicide or are unsuccessful at it than actually get the deed done. Most people are glad they are still alive, and glad for the connections that were created with people who acted on instinct to keep them alive. That sense of isolation, of not mattering to anyone, evaporates as friends or relatives rush to save them. And the ones who take action are not trained in any way. They simply care and act on instinct. The truth is we do care about each other. We need to trust that caring and do the best we can to help.

The young man, a super high school basketball player, has organized his teammates to make social media videos to help others who may be thinking of suicide. And they dedicated their important games to the many Flathead families whose children have died by suicide. They call their efforts, "The Warrior Movement."

We might call them 'Warriors for Life.'




