

### **Cantorial Comments**



### **Sh'ma Koleinu** – Hear our Voices!!

Dear Friends: It is my honor to be able to wish you *Shanah Tovah u'metukah* as we enter the New Year 5784 [2023-2024] for the fifteenth consecutive year together!

The Jewish High Holy Day season is a great gift for our minds, our souls and our hearts. With the dramatic and thought-provoking liturgy and majestic and haunting music, we have the opportunity to sit back and revel in the beauty of

our sanctuary, surrounded by familiar as well as new faces, while remembering those who have come before us. This is the time to contemplate our actions, words and behaviors of the the past year. What are we proud of? How could we have done better? What do we want to do to improve ourselves, but also, how can we be more accepting and less critical of ourselves and others?

As we enter this season of renewal, I have been reflecting on a much-discussed hot topic, especially in the Jewish world - that of ritual transitions - helping to navigate life's inevitable storms of change with ritual practices. It was shared at my Cantor's conference in San Diego this past June, I've heard it on podcasts, discussed it with friends on my summer travels and it is the subject of several upcoming book publications. What rituals do we have and what rituals do we need to create to help us through life's many transitions, be it through illness, personal growth, losses or new relationships? Have you created any rituals of your own as you sit in liminal space and time – the 'hallways' of our lives?

The themes of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are ancient rituals that take us on a journey from creation and renewal to soul-searching and mourning — a shared spiritual Ten Day experience of rebirth and death. The communal rituals of the *Yamim No'raim* — The Days of Awe — offer a time like no other in our Jewish tradition. They are truly physical and tangible from the white clothes we wear and changing the Torah covers to white, reflecting the death shroud as well as purity. Some people refrain from wearing leather shoes, on Yom Kippur, the explanation being that leather once symbolized luxury and high status — so not wearing it signifies that all people are humbled and equal before God. Singing *L'shanah Tovah Tikatevu*, we taste the sweet honey and apples and delicious raisin challah to usher in a sweet New Year; we prostrate ourselves as we sing the *Great Aleinu*; we fast and sing *Ashamnu*, feeling the beating of our hearts as we pound on our chests in communal rhythm, yearning for forgiveness of the wrongs we have committed. We pry open our hearts and our souls sending our breath with pleas to God — to: Hear. Our. Voices. SH'MA KOLEINU! Hear our Voices, not only for the mistakes we have made, the hurts we may have inflicted on one another, but also praying that we may be better caretakers of our Earth and ourselves.

Wishing each and every one of you, from my family to yours, a sweet and meaningful renewal of your hearts and souls as we enter 5784 – *Shanah Tovah*,

Grace us with the faith to know that though, like Jacob, we may be wounded, shaped, and renamed by this struggle, still we will live on to continue an ever unfolding, unpredictable path toward healing. Surround us with loving-kindness, grace, and companionship, and spread over us a sukkat shalom, a shelter of peace and wholeness. And let us say: Amen."

# Kever Avot V'Imahot Service At Our Cemetery During the High Holy Days



It is a long-standing cherished tradition to visit the graves of loved ones during the High Holy Day period. This is known as *Kever Avot V'Imahot* (literally, the graves of the ancestors). At this service special memorial prayers are recited and the rabbi delivers a brief message that stresses the importance of honoring the memories of loved ones

Kever Avot will be held on Sunday, September 10th at 1:00 pm at our Home of Eternity Cemetery, 8th and Sierra Way, San Bernardino. While this service memorializes those buried or entombed at our historic cemetery, it is certainly appropriate for all to attend, even if their loved ones are buried elsewhere. At the end of the service those attending can go to the graves or crypts of loved ones for individual memorial prayers. Rabbi Cohn and Cantor Bern-Vogel will be there to share those prayers with you.

# Congregation Emanu El is pleased to announce that Rabbi Jeffrey K. Salkin will be conducting services for the High Holy Days, with Cantor Jennifer Bern-Vogel



Rabbi Salkin is one of American Judaism's most prolific and most-quoted rabbis.

His column, "Martini Judaism: for those who want to be shaken and stirred," published by the Religion News Service, won a 2022 Wilbur Award from the Religion Communicators Council for best religion column of the year, as well as two previous awards.

Rabbi Salkin's essays have appeared in the Washington Post, Commentary, The Wall Street Journal, The Huffington Post, Tablet, Mosaic, Forward, and JTA. He has discussed the American political scene on CNN and the BBC. He has contributed articles to scholarly journals. His ten books discuss such subjects as bar/bat mitzvah, Israel, masculinity, and Jewish culture, as well as three Torah commentaries. He delivered the keynote on religion and spirituality at the iconic Chautauqua Institution, as well as participating in inter-religious dialogues in international forums.

He recently led a humanitarian mission of Reform rabbis to Krakow, Poland, where they brought more than a ton of supplies for Ukrainian refugees, and he helped lead a Passover Seder at the refugees camps on the Ukraine-Polish border.

His colleagues have described him as "courageous," "always relevant," and "one of American Judaism's true public intellectuals."

Until recently, Rabbi Salkin served as the rabbi of Temple Israel in West Palm Beach, Florida. He is excited about leading services at Emanu El: "I am proud to be able to spend sacred time with this historic Jewish community, and to add my voice and my passion to the experience for the Days of Awe."

### Tashlich on the Afternoon of Rosh Hashanah

All are invited to participate in the Tashlich ceremony that is held on the afternoon of the 1st Day of Rosh Hashanah. Tashlich ("you shall cast out") is a tradition that developed in the Middle Ages. Our ancestors began the practice of walking to the banks of a river or some other body of water on the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah. There, with the recitation of prayers, they would empty their pockets and shake their clothing free of the sins they believed had accumulated there during the previous year. Often they would toss bread crumbs which symbolically represented the sins they wanted to cast off.

Tashlich will be held on Saturday, September 16th at 4:00 pm at Congregation Emanu El. Rabbi Salkin and Cantor Bern-Vogel will lead this brief informal service which includes singing and activities. We encourage you to come dressed casually - preferably in white clothing. You can bring a few bread crumbs to cast into the water. This is a wonderful opportunity for families to join together in a time-honored Jewish tradition.
