Treasurer's Report



The final budget for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 has been approved by the Board of Directors and is published in our *Bulletin* in preparation for the formal presentation at the Congregational Annual Meeting on May 16th. (Please see the following page)

Thank you to our budget committee: Kathy Rosenfeld, Greg Weissman, Paul Zipperstein and Daniel Schwartz. I truly appreciate their help in preparing this budget..

Remember that a budget is a guideline, it is our best *estimate* of what we anticipate to receive in income and what we expect our expenses to be. As always, we do our best to limit our expenses wherever possible, while trying to increase revenues.

Below are a few key points about the Final Budget:

INCOME:

- **Dues Income** We were successful in realizing the budgeted dues income for 23-24. We are projecting the same for 24-25. We are not increasing dues.
- **High Holy Days** We will continue to charge for non-members atteding High Holy Day Services.

EXPENSES:

- Clergy Costs Total Clergy Costs include Cantor's contract and expense for a High Holy Day Rabbi.
- Accounting/Payroll Continue to retain the services of outside accounting and bookkeeping at \$12,000 per year.
- Security Our security costs have increased due to the need for additional security at all events.
- Utilities and Insurance Anticipate increases in our liability insurance and our utilities.

A full budget presentation will be made at our Annual Meeting on May 16th at 7:00 p.m. I look forward to seeing you there!

From Our School for Jewish Living

Last year we explored the holiday of Passover through the lens of Jewish literature. This year we focused on remembering and retelling. Mrs. Zipperstein taught the children to recite and sing the four questions in Hebrew and answer in English. We prepared for our family Seders and the Temple Seder by making matzah covers, a glass for Elijah and a cup for Miriam. If you attended the Temple Seder, there was one of each, from the students, on the table. Special thanks to Miss Karyn and her team of helpers for making the tie dye experience so fun.

Hashavat aveidah is the Jewish value of returning a lost object. We discussed how this value is as much physical as it is emotional for both the person who lost an object, as well as the person who returned it.

In literature (and in our religious education) rocks have always been a symbol of God's reliability and strength. While we were busy with our paints this month, we recycled some river rocks by painting them to use at home, and left some in the Temple's biblical garden. If you see one of the students' rocks, there is a hidden Star of David and their name painted somewhere.

Next month we celebrate Yom Ha'atzma'ut, Israel's Independence Day.

Mental Health Awareness in Action How to Be a Friend

A friend. A dear friend. Maybe someone you've known since you both were kids, hanging out together, playing sports together, then growing up and creating families of friends.

What do you do when you see your friend change into an almost different person? The risk-taking pal suddenly turned dark, dim, and lost. New York Times columnist David Brooks wrote about his friend in his recent book, *How to Know a Person*. His friend was a wonderful husband and father, an eye surgeon, and now he was experiencing a severe depression. And it wouldn't let up, even with the best medical care, even after trying several anti-depressant drugs, he could not return to the man he had been.

And what is a friend to do? What is helpful, what is harmful? Suddenly Brooks was faced with emotional choices, and he didn't know what was best. How should he help his friend?

How many of us have faced a similar situation with people we love? And how many of us have seen that sometimes nothing helps, that our loved ones don't improve? That even sometimes they take their own lives? That is what happened to David Brooks. For all the medical care, all the love and understanding of his wife and sons, and his friends, his friend died by suicide after years of suffering.

By then Brooks had learned something about the nature of depression – not just a sad mood – it was an altered way of perceiving life and a terrible despair. And he learned that trying to cheer him up was useless, and also disrespectful of what was happening to him. He learned to be *with* his friend, listen to him attentively, and love him. He learned to remind him often that he was thinking about him, that he was there for him, that he hadn't given up on him.

It didn't prevent the tragedy of suicide, but it was a kind of accompaniment. They were friends from boyhood to the very end. We can all learn from David Brooks' heart rending experience. Of course, try to get professional help for one close to you who is depressed. Often that is the way out of it. But also, just be with him or her, generous with your attentiveness. There is nothing easy about this accompaniment, but it is the kind way, the loving way, and that he or she deeply needs.

Let's all of us develop a wise awareness in this Mental Health Month.






