

Rabbi Cantor's Comments



WELCOME TO OUR NEWEST FAMILIES!

Although it's been nearly 17 years since we moved to California, I am still struck by the diverse species of succulents and foliage I see walking around my urban neighborhood. Especially awe-inspiring are the expansive **roots** of many older trees, pushing aimlessly through the cracks in the sidewalks, which often can be quite treacherous.

The 15th of Shevat is the New Year for Trees, known as *Tu b'Shevat*. It is one of the four New Year celebrations in the Jewish calendar cycle, the others being Rosh Hashanah, Nisan/Passover, and Elul, the new year of tithing.



The observance of Tu B'shvat is an opportunity to start planting, welcome spring, and connect with greater awareness and intention to nature by tasting different types of fruits of the Land of Israel - olives, dates, grapes, figs and pomegranates, most of which are now growing in our own Biblical Garden!


We read in Deuteronomy 20:19, that a person is compared to "the tree of the field." With our faith and commitment to God, we cultivate strong **roots** and produce the fruits of Torah and Mitzvot. At this year's celebration, we also look forward to welcoming our new families; we encourage them to share their stories and invite them to plant new **roots** with Congregation Emanu El for generations to come!

Mental Health Awareness in Action

Tu B'Shevat Thoughts

As Tu B'Shevat time, the New Year of the Trees is here, we ponder the wisdom of our ancestors. They must have known that trees are important to us, and maybe not just for fruit and wood. There's more, and modern researchers have been exploring that. They've found that trees and other green, growing things help our mental health and general well-being.

For instance, more than one researcher has measured chemicals that trees exude and found how they improve our emotions. The Japanese years ago began Forest Bathing that takes people into the forest for health and healing.

Others have found that people who garden tend to be happier than those who don't. Working with growing things and with soil gives us something we need. Even those with serious mental illness, and those with basic issues like high blood pressure or too much weight, find their problems eased by gardening. Other researchers have studied vacant lots in cities. Where they have planted bushes and trees, they find that passers-by feel happier than those passing by barren lots. And where ugly vacant lots are made into green living places, area violence decreases.

And in some countries doctors give "green prescriptions." Though we are not doctors, we have some green prescriptions to try:

- Every few days take a walk in the woods or through a grassy field
- Walk around your area and admire the neighborhood gardens
- Spend 15 or 20 minutes sitting quietly under a tree or lying on the grass
- Try a bit of gardening
- Do some art, like painting and drawing, plein air (outside)
- If you play a small enough instrument, take it outside and play it among trees and bushes
- If you dance, go outside and dance around a favorite tree of yours
- If you sing, go outside in the morning and sing with the birds

There is something about being close to and interacting with the full range of life on our planet that we relish, that we need for a healthy life. As Rabbi Gershon Winkler says, paying close attention to all the living green, the living soil, is a kind of "Soul Presence," and he it calls "transformative and healing."

Remember Eden was a garden with trees, and the creation of modern Israel was accompanied by planting many thousands of trees.

And one more prescription:

- Go outside and celebrate Tu B'Shevat

February: Celebrating Tu B'Shevat

In February, we will celebrate Tu B'Shevat, the New Year for the Trees! Even if there is still a chill in the air here, the almond trees in Israel will already be beginning to bloom. In class, students will explore why trees are so sacred in Jewish tradition. They will learn about the mitzvah of not wasting resources (**Bal Tashchit**) and may even sample some of the **Seven Species** of Israel, such as figs, dates, and pomegranates. It will be a time to appreciate the natural world that sustains us.



Purim, A Day of Joy & Courage

On March 1st, it will be time to get loud! Purim commemorates the bravery of Queen Esther and the joy of the Jewish people. **The Celebration:** Students and families will be invited to dress up for our annual Purim Spiel. We will shake our groggers, share **Mishloach Manot**, and celebrate the "hidden" miracles in our lives.



April: Our Day of Action

April 12: Building on what we will learn about caring for the earth, our students will put their values into practice during our Day of Action. This won't just be a day of learning — it will be a day of *doing*. Students will participate in hands-on service projects to support our local community. Whether they are packing supplies for those in need or writing notes of gratitude, they will be practicing **Gemilut Hasadim** (acts of loving-kindness). "It is not your duty to finish the work, but neither are you at liberty to neglect it." — *Pirkei Avot 2:16*

We can't wait to see our students grow their roots in March and branch out to help others in April!



Rabbi Michael Lotker is a second career rabbi having been ordained at age 55 from the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in 2003. He is a physicist who spent his first career in Alternative Energy focusing on wind, solar and geothermal energy and is widely published in the alternative energy field.. Rabbi Lotker started a number of alternative energy firms including a wind power development company that installed and operated wind farms in Hawaii and California. He is presently Rabbi Emeritus at Temple Ner Ami in Camarillo, California and the Community Rabbi for the Jewish Federation of Ventura County. He is the author of “A Christian’s Guide to Judaism” which has become a classic work in the field of interfaith dialogue. He is a participant in numerous Jewish-Christian dialogues and is a member of the Priest-Rabbi Dialogue, a project of the Board of Rabbis of Southern California and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Los Angeles.

The Rabbi Norman F. Feldheim Memorial Lecture was established in 1985 at the time of his death by members of Congregation Emanu El as well as many friends in the wider community. Rabbi Feldheim served as rabbi of Congregation Emanu El in San Bernardino from 1937 to 1971 and as Rabbi Emeritus from 1971 until his death.



Rabbi Kohn has served on numerous CCAR, URJ, and communal commissions, committees, and boards, while still savoring time to read, write, and paint, as well as exercise, cook, and travel with his wife, Cindy, and their children and grandchildren.
